Mayor Clough called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m. The secretary called the roll and reported that nine (9) board members were present. Mr. Bibb joined after the roll call. This meeting was conducted by teleconference for members of the Board in accordance with Sub. H.B. 404 of the 133rd General Assembly, passed on November 19, 2020, signed by the Governor of the State of Ohio on November 22, 2020 and the March 9, 2020 order of the Governor of the State of Ohio declaring a public health emergency, this meeting was live-streamed on RTA's Facebook page (<u>www.facebook.com/rideRTA</u>) for staff and members of the public.

The Secretary advised that notice of this meeting have been posted more than twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting, that the usual notification has been given the news media and other interested persons, and that all requirements of the Ohio Revised Code and Rules and Bylaws of this Board regarding notice of meeting have been complied with.

Minutes

Mayor Clough stated that the minutes from the December 15, 2020 Board Meeting had been previously distributed and reviewed and asked whether there were any additions and/or corrections. There were no corrections. The minutes were approved.

Public Comments – Agenda Items (comments were submitted by form and phone)

- <u>Dominic Matthew Cleveland, OH</u> Saw the news about the recently launched Transit Ambassadors program by CPT. These ambassadors are transit riders who will encourage Cleveland residents in their neighborhoods to use transit and communicate any hardships faced by them. Does the RTA propose any assistance in outreach or aiding this grassroots program, given the urgent need to restore public trust in using transit?
- 2. <u>Chris Martin Cleveland, OH</u> Please install mask dispensers on board buses and trains. During this pandemic, masking is extremely important when social distancing is not possible, and providing masks on board buses and trains will help any person who might not otherwise have one. RTA has taken some steps to mitigate transmission of the virus on its vehicles, but not enough. RTA does mandate wearing masks but does not enforce the mandate and not all riders follow it. RTA installed vinyl sheeting to separate operators from riders, but many of these are now broken and many were never used. RTA promised to install hard plastic barriers to separate rider and operator but they have not been installed. RTA will hire 18 cleaners this year to disinfect buses and trains even though we now know the disease spreads more through the air than through surface contact. It is not clear what, if anything, RTA has done to improve ventilation on buses and trains.

We know the more transmissible UK variant of COVID-19 is likely to become the dominant strain in the US by March. This makes it all the more important for RTA do everything it can to protect the riding public as well as its own staff. And you can afford it. RTA ended 2020 with nearly \$140

million in reserves. The second stimulus bill gave you something like \$30 million more and you will receive even more than that under the new president's announced plans. Please install mask dispensers on board buses and trains.

3. <u>Rev. Pam M. Pinkney -- Cleveland, OH</u> -- She congratulated the retirees. She is concerned about Resolution No. 2021-2 concerning Tower City. She asked if the smoking ban included in this project. She supports Cook Paving in Resolution No. 2021-3. She does not like the plastic seats on the bus in Resolution No. 2021-4. She congratulated the retirees.

Ms. Birdsong added that mask are being handed out to riders. Mask are required on RTA buses and trains. Signage is on the front of the bus and on the website. Operators are not encouraged to engage people not wearing mask to avoid altercations. If there is someone that is a nuisance to customers, the operator can contact Transit Police for assistance. The hard plastic barriers are being procured. They will be received in the next several weeks. Rev. Lucas asked if the barriers will be placed on paratransit vehicles. Dr. Caver said they are looking at what can be put on paratransit buses.

Introduction of Resolutions

A. 2021-1 – Expressing congratulations to the employees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority who retired during the fourth quarter of 2020, the adoption of which was moved by Mr. Serrano, seconded by Rev. Lucas and approved by unanimous vote.

Mr. Fields said there were 18 retirees. Mayor Clough thanked them for their service.

B. 2021-2 – Authorizing an increase to Contract No. 2018-070 with E.L. Robinson Engineering for Project 52N Engineering Services for the Tower City East Portal Rehabilitation in the amount of \$220,459.54 for a total contract amount of \$989,942.01 and reinstating the General RTA Board of Trustees January 19, 2021 Page 3 of 7

Manager, Chief Executive Officer's change order signing authority in its entirety (RTA Development Fund, Engineering & Project Development Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Mr. Serrano, seconded by Ms. Pellot and approved by unanimous vote.

A number of the resolutions have gone through committee.

C. 2021-3 – Authorizing Contract No. 2020-182 with Cook Paving & Construction, Co., Inc. for Project 18.71 – GCRTA Salt Storage Facilities, in an amount not to exceed \$275,000.00 (RTA Development Fund, Engineering & Project Development Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Mr. Joyce, seconded by Ms. Moss and approved by unanimous vote.

This is for a salt facility, but the procurement for salt will follow the normal practice. This is our first step towards housing our salt so we can be less depended on previous practices and be more proactive for the winter.

D. 2021-4 -- Authorizing Contract No. 2020-189 with the Aftermarket Parts Company, LLC for the furnishing of Gemini Plastic Seat Inserts (back & bottom-with drain holes), as specified and as required, for a period of one (1) year in an amount not to exceed \$385,078.32 (General Fund, Fleet Management Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Chief McCall, seconded by Mr. Serrano and approved by unanimous vote.

Ms. Birdsong said this would bring us up to date with the plastic seating for all Gillig vehicles in the fleet. The plastic seating is easier to maintain and clean. We are moving away from the fabric seating, which is harder to clean. We are looking to have the entire fleet fitted with plastic. Paratransit has vinyl because of the longer seat ride and fabrication of the vehicles. There are variations within plastic seating to assist with sliding. That has been reviewed as well as drainage.

- E. 2021-5 Authorizing Contract No. 2021-001 with Oracle Corporation to provide Oracle Software Maintenance and Support Services for a period of one year in an amount not to exceed \$388,132.99 (General Fund, Information Technology Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Mr. Serrano, seconded by Ms. Pellot and approved by unanimous vote.
- F. 2021-6 Authorizing Contract No. 2021-002 with Ultramain Systems, Inc. to provide software maintenance for the Authority's CITME Maintenance and Materials Management System for a period of one year in an amount not to exceed \$373,093.80, with two annual renewals in amounts not to exceed \$386,152.09 and \$399,667.41, respectively, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$1,158,913.30. (General Fund, Information Technology Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Ms. Moss, seconded by Mr. Joyce and approved by unanimous vote.
- G. 2021-7 Authorizing a Memorandum of Understanding with the Cuyahoga County Board of Health for implementation of the Baby on Board Program, the adoption of which was moved by Rev. Lucas, seconded by Mayor Byrne and approved by unanimous vote.

Angela Newman White, the grant supervisor at the Cuyahoga County Board of Health was on the line. They are excited to enter into a MOU with RTA to support transportation needs of families in three targeted zip codes with the overall goal to improve birth and health outcomes. They are confident that through their partnership they will be able to disseminate the resources and provide documentation and reporting. Ms. Moss asked if this is a pilot program since it only targets three zip codes as opposed to other people who may need the service, who are not in those zip codes. Ms. Birdsong said this is a pilot. They have determined the locations in concert the County. It is important for RTA to be invested in the community and the future of Cleveland and Ohio wide residents. codes and census tracks have the highest infant mortality in the area. It is a two-year program. It will provide transportation for young women to get to the doctor and help decrease immortality rates in this area.

H. 2021-8 -- Authorizing the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority to grant a permanent right-of-way and easement to the East Ohio Gas Company ("Dominion") to access and maintain the measuring and regulating station on Cuyahoga County Permanent Parcel Number 671-07-002, located at the Hayden Garage in East Cleveland, Ohio for the price of \$10,000.00, the adoption of which was moved by Mr. Joyce, seconded by Ms. Moss and approved by unanimous vote.

Interim Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Dr. Caver gave the report. The unemployment rate for the nation was 6.7% in December 2020. The county and state numbers have not come out, but we have traditionally been higher than the country. Nationally, 9.8 million jobs have been lost since Feb. 2020. They have been in industries that affect our community. It is predicted that the second half of 2020 may get better as the vaccine is disseminated throughout the country. February-April, 22 million jobs were lost. Over half have been re-gained by December 2020, but there are some shifts that will affect RTA. One is that in December 2020, nearly 25% of all employees were able to telework. This will present challenges for transit agencies and city centers related to taxing and economic activity. Another aspect is that government employment is down nationwide by 45,000 jobs. Government jobs are important because they are some of the largest employers in the community. About one and six restaurants have closed. This is money that will leave the community and jobs. Leisure and hospitality had the largest loss in jobs. Other job categories are trending up.

Ridership throughout the Pandemic was down about 54%. We have kept that at 50-55% down throughout the recovery. Passenger fares has a direct impact on revenue. Revenue compared to 2019, was down by 57%. Sales tax has been resilient. It has not taken the negative drop expected. The unemployment supplemental payments have helped. The last stimulus package and the next one will help keep cash in people's hand. The technicals do not suggest that given a 7% national unemployment rate that sales tax will be robust going forward. Online sales has had a tremendous increase in sales tax. Motor vehicles and alcohol sales have been steady.

General Manager, Chief Executive Officer Report

Ms. Birdsong gave the presentation. In 2020, we received about \$112 million through the CARES Act. All of that funding was drown down by October 2020. The money was used to offset operating expenses and to keep us afloat. We did not incur any layoffs or terminations as a result of COVID. We are currently operating at 93% of normal service levels. For 2021, the COVID relief package is expected to be able to provide us with \$50-\$60 million or better. This is an estimate. We have not received the final time table to determine what finances will look like through the 2nd round of the Coronavirus Response & Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) for 2021. We have been advised that there is a total of \$14 billion awarded to transit agencies in the nation. The Cleveland Urbanized Area (CUZA) is expected to be awarded about \$74.3 million. This includes Cleveland RTA, Medina, Laketran, Akron, Metro PARTA and Geauga County. The Board and public will be updated on the expected funds.

There has been a lot of conversation and media coverage regarding the COVID-19 vaccine and who can take it and when. We have been in conversation with frontiine employees and finding what the City of Cleveland is undergoing regarding vaccination and when it will be our turn to get the vaccine. In order to prepare for this information, all RTA employees were surveyed to gauge their interest in taking the vaccine to have data to respond regarding demand for RTA. All responses will remain anonymous. There will be a two-week turnaround for responses that should be received by the end of the month. Employees will be notified on where to get the vaccine once it is available. They are not mandating that all employees take

the vaccine. However, they will continue to update that progress as the Pandemic continues. Rev. Lucas said that he would receive the vaccine as a member of the leadership of the Board.

Ohio Loves Transit is traditionally hosted annually in Columbus. It will be a virtual event this year for format and looking through the different ways to communicate through the transit industry with legislators and staff to be able to stand behind transit and continue to advocate for funding and continuous of service. RTA will attend virtually. OLT cookies were placed at the Board desk that will be sent to our legislatures as a thank you and reminder that we are an essential service. The purpose of Ohio Loves Transit is to educate and inform passengers, stakeholders and community leaders about the importance of public transportation. The goals are to meet in person or virtually to explain our need for support whether its engagement regarding eligibility for grants and funding or whether it is general advocates for safe passage for riders and operators through COVID.

Due to reconstruction on track 13 on Tower City, Red Line riders will board and exit at a different location through spring of this year. The Blue and Green Line is not affected. Check the website for updates. Mayor Paul A. Koomar of Bay Village will join the Board in March. He was appointed by the Cuyahoga County Mayors and Managers City Managers Association. He will take the seat of current RTA Board President, Mayor Dennis M. Clough of Westlake. Mayor Clough welcomed the mayor. He has worked with him over the years through the Council of Governments in the Westshore area. He has a financial background that will be of assistance and will be a great addition to the Board. Mayor Koomar said he would be happy to serve.

All Board members are reminded to get their audit feedback to Anthony Garofoli for the 2021 Internal Audit program by this Friday. He and his staff is finalizing an authority-wide risk assessment to formulate the audit plan for your review and approval next month. Transit Police body cameras and portable radios have arrived. We have a kick off meeting scheduled and we are ahead of schedule for this project. We will come back to the Board on policies and procedures and how to distribute the cameras. The American Public Transportation Association (APTA) requested to have the Rail Conference confirmed here in Cleveland in June. That will be on the heels of the NFL Draft planned for Cleveland in April/May. The rodeo was cancelled, but the conference will go forward. Interviews for Deputy General Manager positions and the Chief of Police are ongoing. There should be updates within the next quarter for all three positions. The Ad Hoc Technology Committee will meet Feb. 4 at 5 p.m. in the Main Office or virtually for those who would like to attend. Rev. Lucas asked when the hiring would be completed. She said they are wrapping up the DGM interviews. They expect to select a candidate for one DGM position by the end of this month and the end of next month for the other DGM. The Chief of Police position should be selected by the first of March.

President's Report

Mayor Clough reminded the Board that the Nominating Committee for the President and Vice President needs one more volunteer from the Board, namely a County appointee since someone from the City and Mayors has been identified. The committee member should not be interested in running for office. Please notify Theresa if you are interested. All interested in running for office should send a letter to the committee by the end of February so the Board can select the officers at the March Board Meeting.

Public comments on non-agenda items

Comments were received via form and by dial in. Comments were limited to two minutes.

 <u>Rev. Pamela M. Pinkney – Cieveland, OH</u> – She hasn't received a returned phone call from Mayor Jackson. She opposes the plastic seats in Resolution 2021-4. She is concerned about the violence taking place locally and globally. She is disappointed in Ms. Birdsong's work. She requested a meeting. She has some concerns she wants to discuss with her. > <u>Rico Dancy - Cleveland, OH</u> - He is a Board member at WMATA in D.C. They have a Video Remote Interpreter (VRI) app on every phone of the police department. He asked if the Board is considering an app to assist Transit Police in communicating with the deaf community. Dr. Caver will provide an update with what his staff came up with concerning this app.

Ms. Birdsong said a few apps have come to staff's attention that have been forwarded to Transit Police. She said she would reach out to Rev. Pinkney to discuss her concerns.

- 3. Donte Taylor -- He applauded RTA on their time and effort on the paratransit and big bus service.
- 4. <u>Bob Ross</u> Thank you Mayor Clough for your service to GCRTA. Welcome to Mayor Koomar of Bay Village. Perhaps an expansion of the Board would be appropriate in these challenging times. I would really like to see a member that uses RTA extensively. It's time to give the Riders some representation. 2021 is the time...tet's do it!
- 5. <u>No Name</u> RTA is hiring 18 more vehicle cleaners, and has been focusing on cleaning during the COVID-19 pandemic, even though we have learned that the disease commonly spreads through the air instead of through touching surfaces. One, please install permanent (not plastic curtains) barriers in all buses and trains and two, make masks available to all riders who enter RTA vehicles - trains, buses and vans throughout the service region. RTA has received pandemic funds to be used for just these purposes.

The virus is contracted most easily thru the air we breathe. By that rider putting on a mask he is protecting all the other riders on the bus (who have masks on) and the bus driver. Having masks available at RTA in Tower City is not helpful in getting a mask to someone who is boarding a bus. Please use some of the money you are receiving from the government because of the pandemic for this pandemic-related issue. Thank you.

Related to the question on expanding the Board, Ms. Benford said the RTA Board appointments are set up by the formation of the Board by agreement between the County, the City of Cleveland and Mayors & Managers in the County. Mayor Clough said that the RTA Board has no power on expanding the Board. The three agencies would have to do that.

Should the Authority determine that an agreement could not be reached with the most qualified firm, it may reject that proposal and repeat the process with the next most qualified firm. In this instance, negotiations were held with Michael Baker International, Inc., the first ranked firm, and an acceptable price was reached.

Michael Baker International, Inc. has successfully completed projects for the GCRTA, DART (Dallas, TX), the LA Metro, and ODOT, among others.

The Procurement Department performed a cost analysis and determined the proposed pricing from Michael Baker International, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$490,211.00 to be fair and reasonable to the Authority. This negotiated price is 8.9% above the Engineer's Estimate.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Authority to enter into a contract for overhead door repair and maintenance services at various facilities throughout the Authority, as specified and as required, for a base period of three years, with two, one-year options, for a total contract period of five years.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: This project provides services to repair and maintain the overhead doors at various facilities across the Authority due to damage from accidents, as well as failures from age and normal wear. This service maintains the security of the Authority's buildings and equipment, as well as prevents employees and assets from being exposed to inclement weather.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Invitation for Bid ("IFB") was posted on the procurement web site and advertised in the local newspapers. Notifications were sent to six potential bidders. Five interested parties downloaded the solicitation from the web site. Two responsive bids from responsible bidders were opened on December 29, 2020. A summary is as follows:

The bid of ADMJ Holdings LLC, DBA Advance Door Co. has been determined by the Procurement Department to be the lowest responsive bid from a responsible bidder. The contract will include both material and labor, at the labor rates contained in the bid document. The "not to exceed" amount is based on the average cost incurred on both material and labor over the past three years, resulting in an estimated annual cost of \$135,000.00, for a three year base period not to exceed \$405,000.00, with two, one-year options not to exceed \$135,000.00 each, for a total contract not to exceed \$675,000.00. A price analysis was performed and the Procurement Department has determined the price to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 0% DBE goal was established for this procurement due to the lack of certified DBE firms.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This procurement will be funded through the General Fund, Service Management Department budget, in an amount not to exceed \$405,000.00, at established hourly rates, for the base period of three years, with two, one year options in an amount not to exceed \$135,000 per year, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$675,000.00.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: <u>Reject this offer</u>. Rejection of this offer would delay the continued repair and maintenance service required on the Authority's overhead doors, potentially exposing the Authority's employees and assets to financial and safety risks.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Authority to enter into a contract to provide construction services for Project 52T – Light Rail Track Rehabilitation Buckeye-Woodhill to Shaker Square.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The work to be performed under this contract consists of the rehabilitation of east and westbound tracks from Buckeye-Woodhill Station to Shaker Square from station 225+00 to 307+50.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Invitation for Bid ("IFB") was posted on the GCRTA Procurement website and advertised in the local newspapers. Twenty-one interested parties, including potential subcontractors, downloaded the solicitation package. Two responsive bids were received and opened on January 26, 2021, as follows:

The Basis of Award is the lowest responsive bid from a responsible bidder for the Total Base Bid price. RailWorks Track Services, Inc. was determined to be a responsible bidder. The Total Base Bid price of \$7,996,000.00 from RailWorks Track Services, Inc. is 19.6% less than the Engineer's Estimate of \$9,948,950.00.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 9% participation goal was established for this procurement. RailWorks Track Services, Inc. has committed to achieving the DBE participation through the utilization of Cook Paving and Construction (African American female-owned) in the amount of \$720,000.00 or 9%.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.

- PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Authority to increase the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer's original change order signing authority for this contract.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: Project 52M Rehabilitation of Tracks 10 and 13 at Tower City Station is 139 days away from final completion. This request will increase the General Manager/Chief Executive Officer's change order signing authority for this contract by \$250,000.00. This action will streamline the processing of any change order that might be needed during the remainder of the project and ensure that the project is completed on time.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Contract No. 2019-001 was competitively bid and awarded to RailWorks Track Services, Inc. on March 26, 2019, by Resolution No. 2019-027, in an amount of \$11,860,000.00. There have been 16 change orders, as detailed in the attached Change Order Log, totaling \$471,070.66. The current balance in the change order signing authority stands at \$28,929.34. This request will increase the authority by \$250,000.00 bringing the total change order authority authorized under this contract to \$750,000.00. This is an approximate 6% increase to the original contract total.
- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 17% DBE goal was established on this procurement in 2018. Railworks Track Services, Inc. has agreed to maintain the established DBE participation goal on the project through the use of existing DBE firms.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will renew an existing agreement with the City of Shaker Heights to perform landscape maintenance of the Authority's right of way along the Blue and Green Lines and remove snow from the Authority's rail station parking lots within the City.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The initial Governmental Interagency Agreement was entered into as part of the Mass Transit System Transfer Agreement by which the Authority acquired the Shaker Heights Rapid Transit System, including the rights-of-way. Shaker Heights reserved to itself the right to perform those services, and the Authority agreed to compensate the City for its labor and material costs pursuant to a fixed schedule of services. This new agreement is for three years, which coincides with the terms of the City's union agreements.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The initial agreement, entered into on November 23, 1982 and amended on May 1, 2000 and again on February 23, 2001, is an ongoing contractual agreement with the City of Shaker Heights for the maintenance of grounds adjoining rail rights-ofway. It delineated the respective responsibilities as to the maintenance of those grounds and facilities adjoining the Blue and Green Lines of the Authority. Ohio Revised Code 306.43(H)(4) permits a regional transit authority to enter into agreements for goods or services with another political subdivision without competition.

The cost for the period from January 2021 through December 2023 is not to exceed \$824,305.78. The annual cost is \$273,031.34 for year 2021, \$274,762.82 for year 2022 and \$276,511.62 for year 2023. This three-year total is approximately 1.5% below the previous contract pricing.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: The Office of Business Development does not conduct Affirmative Action reviews or establish DBE participation goals on governmental contracts or interagency agreements.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: This action will carry out a provision of the agreement by which the Authority acquired the Blue and Green Lines.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This agreement will be funded through the General Fund, Rail District Department budget, in an amount not to exceed \$824,305.78 for the three-year period.

AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF SHAKER HEIGHTS FOR LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE AND PARKING LOT SNOW REMOVAL FOR A PERIOD OF THREE YEARS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$824,305.78 (GENERAL FUND, RAIL DISTRICT DEPARTMENT BUDGET)

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code, Section 306.43(H)(4) permits a regional transit authority to enter into agreements for goods or services with another political subdivision without competition; and

WHEREAS, by virtue of the Mass Transit System Transfer Agreement of 1975, the City of Shaker Heights ("City") and the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") agreed that the City will perform maintenance of grounds adjoining rail rights-of-way and will remove snow from the Authority's parking lots at rail stations within the City and that the Authority shall reimburse the City for the cost thereof; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to renew this Agreement for a period of three years commencing January 1, 2021 and ending December 31, 2023 for a total amount not to exceed \$824,305.78.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, Cuyahoga County, Ohio:

Section 1. That the CEO, General Manager/Secretary-Treasurer of the Authority be and she is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement with the City of Shaker Heights for the maintenance of grounds adjoining rail rights-of-way and removal of snow from the Authority's parking lots at rail stations within said city for the period commencing January 1, 2021 and ending December 31, 2023.

Section 2. That said agreement shall be payable from the General Fund, Rail District Department budget in an amount of \$273,031.34 for year 2021, \$274,762.82 for year 2022 and \$276,511.62 for year 2023, for a total amount not to exceed \$824,305.78 for the three-year period.

Section 3. - 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will authorize an increase in the Fiscal Year ("FY") 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget appropriation by \$124,500,000.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund was adopted by the Board of Trustees on May 12, 2020 through Resolution No. 2020-039 and on December 15, 2020 by Resolution No. 2020-100. In December 2020, the scope of work for the procurement of rail cars had not been sufficiently finalized to include reasonable appropriation for the rail car replacement program in the FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget. An additional appropriation of \$64,500,000 will provide sufficient balance for the rail car replacement program in FY 2021.

On December 27, 2020, President Trump signed H.R. 133, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act ("CRRSAA"). This Act provides \$14 billion in emergency funding for transit agencies to be managed by the Federal Transit Administration ("FTA"). The Authority is estimating to receive \$60,000,000 through CRRSAA to cover operating expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The proposed amendment to the FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget will increase the overall appropriation by \$124,500,000 in order to establish the proper budget authority to cover funding to be received from the Federal Transit Administration ("FTA") under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act ("CRRSAA") estimated at \$60,000,000 and \$64,500,000 for the rail car replacement program.

- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 4.0 POLICY IMPACT: The FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget provides for the upkeep of the Authority's existing infrastructure, facilities, equipment, vehicle replacement programs, and also provides for the implementation of projects included in the Long-Range Plan. The funds expensed under the CRRSAA grant will be 100% federally funded, with no local match requirement.
- 5.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: These revisions will increase the total FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget appropriation established in Resolution Nos. 2020-39 and 2020-100 by \$124,500,000. This increase in the FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget will enable the Authority to procure new rail cars and use the CRRSAA Act funding to reimburse the Operating budget for operating expenses incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

- 6.0 ALTERNATIVES: Not approve the budget revision as proposed. This would leave insufficient funding in the Capital Budget and delay procurement for the proposed projects into future years.
- 7.0 RECOMMENDATION: The proposed amendment to the FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget appropriation was reviewed by the Board's Operational Planning & Infrastructure Committee on February 2, 2021. It is recommended that the Board adopt the amended FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget appropriation as proposed.

WHEREAS, there is both a legal and a managerial requirement to establish the revenues to be received for the upcoming fiscal year, including all taxes, user fees, and other types of revenues, as well as estimates of all expenditures or outlays for the capital programs of this public transportation system to be paid or met from said revenue during each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet those requirements, a Capital Improvement Fund budget for the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") for Fiscal Year ("FY") 2021, beginning January 1, 2021 and ending December 31, 2021 was prepared and adopted by the Board of Trustees on May 12, 2020 through Resolution Nos. 2020-39 and 2020-100 on December 15, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on December 27, 2020, President Trump signed H.R. 133, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act ("CRRSAA"); and

WHEREAS, the CRRSAA provides \$25 billion in aid to individuals, businesses, and hospitals in response to the economic distress caused by the coronavirus ("COVID-19") pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the CRRSAA provides \$14 billion in emergency funding for transit agencies to be managed by the Federal Transit Administration ("FTA") through the Transit Award Management System ("TrAMS"); and

WHEREAS, the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority is increasing its appropriation by \$60,000,000 through CRRSAA to cover operating expenses incurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic in FY 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will require an additional \$64,500,000 appropriation for the rail car replacement program during FY 2021; and

WHEREAS, this funding was not included in the FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget and there is a need to increase the FY 2021 Capital Improvement Fund budget appropriation by \$124,500,000; and

WHEREAS, increasing the appropriation for the Capital Improvement Fund by \$124,500,000 will establish a sufficient balance in the FY 2021 Capital Budget to align with funding to be advanced for the rail car replacement program and funding to reimburse the Operating budget for operating expenses incurred due to COVID-19.

AMENDING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES FOR THE GREATER CLEVELAND REGIONAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY, AS ADOPTED IN RESOLUTION NO. 2020-101 AND TO PROVIDE FOR A \$15,000,000 TRANSFER TO THE DEVELOPMENT FUND AND INCREASING APPROPRIATION TO THE RESERVE FUND BY \$28,000,000 FOR RAIL CAR REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Authority has both a legal and managerial requirement to establish the revenues to be received for the upcoming fiscal year, including all taxes, user fees, and other types of revenues, as well as estimates of all expenditures or outlays for the operation of this public transportation system in the fiscal year to be paid or met from said revenue; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet those requirements, a budget for the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2021 and ending December 31, 2021 ("FY 2021") was prepared; and

WHEREAS, the Reserve Fund helps to protect the Authority from future economic downturns, as well as significant increases in fuel and hospitalization costs, to financially plan for payment of earned vacation hours when an employee separates or retires, to establish a method to account for future budget years with 27 pay periods, and to accumulate sufficient funds to replace the Authority's aging revenue vehicles; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the Authority to increase the appropriation in the Reserve Fund by \$28 million for the rail car replacement program. This would increase the Reserve Fund appropriation from \$21 million to \$49 million; and

WHEREAS, the Capital Improvement Fund is used for the construction and acquisition of major capital facilities and equipment, including purchasing of revenue vehicles; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the Authority to increase the transfer to the Capital Improvement Fund for the rail car replacement program by \$15 million, to establish sufficient funding in the FY 2021 Capital Budget; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees adopted the FY 2021 General Fund Budget on December 15, 2020 through Resolution No. 2020-101; and

WHEREAS, the Operational Planning & Infrastructure Committee of the Board of Trustees reviewed and discussed the proposed increase to the FY 2021 General Fund Budget on February 2, 2021 and recommended its approval by the Board on February 16, 2021.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, Cuyahoga County, Ohio:

Section 1. That the appropriations for the current expenses and other expenditures of the Authority, during the period of January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021 ("Fiscal Year 2021"), as set forth in Resolution No. 2020-101, adopted by the Board on December 15, 2020 are hereby amended as follows:
