MEETING NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the following meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority will take place at <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 31</u>, <u>2023</u> in the Board Room of the Authority, 1240 West Sixth Street, Cleveland, OH 44113 for consideration of the listed items and such other items that may properly come before the Board and be acted upon. This meeting will be live streamed on RTA's Board Page <u>www.RideRTA.com/board</u> via the meeting date for staff and members of the public. Members of the public may attend in person.

Based on Centers for Disease Control ("CDC") guidance to avoid crowded places where you cannot stay 6 feet away from others and Ohio Department of Public Health advice regarding congregating and social distancing, as well as RTA's interest in protecting community and employee health and safety, RTA Board Room and Meeting Room 1 capacity is limited to thirty-six (36) people to allow for social distancing. To accommodate members of the public, RTA will limit the number of staff permitted in the Board Room. All persons entering RTA's Main Office Building ("MOB") at 1240 West 6th Street are required to maintain a distance of six feet or more from other individuals who are not members of their family or household.

As a result of a federal court order on April 18, 2022, the CDC's January 29, 2021 order requiring masks on public transportation conveyances and at transportation hubs is no longer in effect. The CDC continues to recommend that people wear masks in indoor public transportation settings at this time. As a result, GCRTA recommends, but will not require, that members of the public wear a mask/face covering.

Tower City Fire Update

Chief Jones, Chief of Police/Director of Security, informed the Board that at 6:30 a.m. today a male suspect set fire to a trash can at Tower City. Afterwards he immediately boarded a westbound Red Line train. He was apprehended at the Puritas Station by Transit Police. Cleveland Fire extinguished

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the fire. The suspect was taken to the County jail and will be charged with aggravated arson. The suspect demonstrated behavior consistent with mental illness. The investigation is ongoing. Dr. Caver added that the team is working to service the station via track 7. There was a temporary interruption in service due to the fire and sprinkler system. The station should soon be dry and available for public usage.

Executive Session Requested

It was moved by Mayor Koomar, seconded by Ms. Pellot. There were eight (8) ayes and none opposed.

10:35 a.m. - It was moved by Mayor Weiss, seconded by Ms. Pellot to come out of executive session. There were eight (8) ayes and none opposed.

President Lucas added that Mr. Joyce wished the Board a happy holiday. He is out of town.

Introduction of Resolutions:

- L. 2022-118 Authorizing a Memorandum of Understanding with the Group Plan Commission and the City of Cleveland for proposed Public Square improvements in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00, the adoption of which was moved by Ms. Welch, seconded by Ms. Pellot. Ms. McCall asked for a roll call. There were seven (7) ayes and one (1) abstention by Ms. McCall. It passed.
- A. 2022-107 Authorizing Contract No. 2022-083 with ETC Institute to provide On-Board Origin-Destination Passenger Surveys in an amount not to exceed \$931,560.86 (RTA Development Fund, Programming and Planning Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Mayor Biasiotta, seconded by Ms. Moss and approved by unanimous vote.
 - Mayor Weiss asked if this is federally funded. Mr. Schipper said this is 80% federally funded out of our normal formula funding grant. We do this survey every 10 years. We have allocated over \$1 million with the 80/20 split. It's done every 10 years to tie it to the census data, which then they can share with NOACA.
- B. 2022-108 Authorizing Contract No. 2022-84 with Occupational Health Centers of Ohio, P.A., CO. dba Concentra Medical Centers for Off-Site Medical Services and Specimen Collection in an amount not to exceed \$979,110.00 for three years with two, one-year options in an amount not to exceed \$326,370.00 for each option year, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$1,631,850.00 (General Fund, Labor and Employee Relations Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Ms. Moss, seconded by Mayor Weiss and approved by unanimous vote.

- Ms. Moss added that she had issues with this contract since there was only one bid. She spoke to staff and was informed that if not passed this will slow down the rail car project. The price was negotiated lower than the original bid. She will vote in support, but she'd like to see more bidders. Ms. McCall asked for an overview on the procurement process.
- D. 2022-110 Authorizing Contract No. 2022-132 with Transpro Consulting to provide Performance Management Services in an amount not to exceed \$183,072.00 for a one-year period, and in an amount not to exceed \$186,764.00 for one, one-year option, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$369,836.00 (General Fund, Executive Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Ms. McCall, seconded by Ms. Welch. Ms. Moss asked for a roll call. There were six (6) ayes and one (1) opposition by Ms. Moss. It passed.

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Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Rajan Gautam, Deputy General Manager of Finance and Secretary-Treasurer, gave the report. The annual inflation rate in the U.S. has increased from 2.5% in January 2020 to a high of 9.1% in June 2022. The purchasing power has weakened in recent years. This is the extent to which a person or company has available funds to make purchases. Since June 2022, the inflation rate has been falling. At the end of November, inflation is down to 7.1% and is expected to continue to fall in 2023 based on the aggressive posturing by the feds. As recently as last week, they raised the interest rate by .5% bringing the current rates to 4.25% to 4.5%.

The unemployment rate rose for Cuyahoga County, Ohio and the U.S. The U.S. rate for October was 3.7% up from 3.5%. Ohio's rate increased from 4% in September to 4.2% in October. The county rate which is not seasonally adjusted causing the increased rate of 5.2% in October up from 4.9% in September. In reviewing the five largest metropolitan statistical areas in Ohio. For October, unemployment MSA rates for Cleveland and Columbus remained steady at 5.1% and 3.5%. Cincinnati rose from 3.5% to 3.6%. Dayton rose from 3.9% to 4.1%. Toledo rose from 4.1% to 4.3%.

November Ridership was up 16.8% compared to last year. YTD ridership is 18.2% above 2021 levels and 8.8% above 2020 levels. Ridership of 17.3 million in 2022 is a 41.5% decline in ridership compared to 29.6 million in 2019. Passenger fares is -14.2% below November 2021 due to the timing of receiving \$481,000 in passenger fares. YTD passenger fares are 39.3% above 2021 levels. Sales tax has remained strong throughout the year. December 2022 receipts which is based on September 2022 activity was 9.2% higher than last December and 10.5% higher than budgeted amounts. YTD they are 6.5% higher than 2021 levels. Eleven of the twenty-three categories were positive in December compared to the previous month. Motor vehicles and watercraft were 43.9% higher. Online sales were 31.7% higher. Regular and statewide sales were 9.3% higher.

General Manager/CEO Report

India L. Birdsong Terry, General Manager, CEO gave the report. Senator Sherod Brown announced that RTA was awarded \$8 million for the E. 79th Street Light Rail Station improvements to make it ADA compliant. The PTASP Labor/Management Safety Committee was formed to ensure collaboration between the ATU Local 268 and GCRTA management. RTA is in the minority of agencies that were able to form the committee and approve the PTASP, which was required by the federal government. She thanked the union leadership for their partnership and work of the legal department, labor management department and safety department.

Ms. Birdsong Terry attended the Making Connections 2022 National Conference December 13-14 in D.C. She served on a panel with national union leaders and management leaders and discussed workforce development, diversity and technology. She served on the WTS panel December 8 with leaders at the Cuyahoga County Planning, Greater Cleveland Partnership and Port of Cleveland. They discussed the vision for the future of Cleveland and Northeast Ohio region. Stantec, a global leader in sustainable engineering was recognized internationally for Planning Excellence by the Royal Town Planning Institute for their work on RTA's transit-oriented community corridor plan for W. 25th.

Hennes Communications conducted crisis communication training with RTA staff Nov. 21 and Dec. 12. Seventy-five (75) employees attended the training. Project Management training was held in November as a 3-day pilot. The Group met and developed content based on Federal Transportation Agency Project & Construction Management Guidelines. Mandatory training starts January 2023 for Directors and Deputies. Ms. Birdsong Terry held several Town Halls this month around the Authority. Employees received an update on RTA projects and programs and were able to ask questions.

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The Cleveland Reads Citywide Challenge kicked-off on Saturday, December 17, 2022. The challenge is to read one million books and/or one million minutes in 2023. Several RTA buses are wrapped with the program advertisement. The program received good media coverage.

Public Comments - public transit related items

- Rev. Pamela M. Pinkney Butts The operator on Route #1, coach #3855 said they don't feel
 comfortable making a complaint and believe they may be retaliated against. There is poor
 communication between the operators, mechanics and supervisors. There are not enough
 coaches and not enough interaction with the community. There are no union representatives
 at the Board Meetings. Lenny Stover had to leave, but he wanted an update on the Red Line
 Greenway. She asks that RTA partner with her on a literacy program.
- 2. <u>Loh</u> She ask that text messages resume to communicate service issues. RTA needs to look at the bidding process and design of buses.
- 3. Airric Stewart Mr. Stewart repeated his plan for the reinstatement of the 15A route.
- 4. <u>Pluria Gardner</u> She suggested RTA look at the plan to reinstate the 15A route with the suggested changes which give riders greater interior access to business, schools and museums; better connecting the north and southeast communities. She asked why the CAC meetings was cancelled and when will they resume.
 - Ms. Walker Minor said they are reevaluating the CAC. They have a transition plan and will resume meetings in January 2023.
- 5. Dontez Taylor He suggested the disabled community be involved in choosing new vehicles.
- 6. <u>Dominic Gattozzi</u> (webform comment) I have noticed an increase in smokers on the redline even during the morning and afternoon work commute with fairly full trains. Perhaps this would be a good area for the transit ambassadors to address to make everyone's commute more enjoyable.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a contract to provide construction services for Project 12D Trunk Line Signal System.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The work required under this contract consists of the resignalization along the Trunk Line between East 79th Street Station to Shaker Square. This work includes, but is not limited to, providing all labor, equipment, materials, and design and field engineering.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Invitation for Bids ("IFB") was posted on the GCRTA Procurement website and advertised in the local newspapers. Thirteen interested parties, including potential subcontractors, downloaded the solicitation package. Two bids were received and opened on December 15, 2022 as follows:

The Basis of Award is the lowest responsive bid from a responsible bidder for the Total Base Bid price. The Total Base Bid price of \$4,464,789.20 from Clark Transportation Consulting & Services, LLC DBA Bison Rail Systems is 0.56% greater than the Engineer's Estimate of \$4,440,000.00. Clark Transportation Consulting & Services, LLC DBA Bison Rail Systems was determined to be a responsible bidder.

A cost analysis has been performed, and the bid of Clark Transportation Consulting & Services, LLC DBA Bison Rail Systems has been determined by the Procurement Department to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 17% DBE goal was established for this procurement. The prime contractor is Clark Transportation Consulting & Services, a certified DBE (African American Male-owned) firm fulfilling the DBE participation goal established for this contract.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a contract to provide construction services for Project 12D(a) Bungalow Foundations for the Trunk Line Resignaling.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The work required under this contract consists of the construction of seven bungalow housing foundations along the Trunk Line between East 79th Street Station and Shaker Square. Work includes coordination with the signal contractor under project 12D.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Invitation for Bids ("IFB") was posted on the Authority's Procurement website and advertised in the local newspapers. Twelve interested parties, including potential subcontractors, downloaded the solicitation package. Three bids were received and opened on November 30, 2022, as follows:

The Basis of Award is the lowest responsive bid from a responsible bidder for the Total Base Bid price. The Total Base Bid price of \$347,000.00 from Northeast Ohio Trenching Service, Inc. is 3.61% less than the Engineer's Estimate of \$360,000.00. Northeast Ohio Trenching Service, Inc. was determined to be a responsible bidder.

A cost analysis has been performed, and the bid of Northeast Ohio Trenching Service, Inc. has been determined by the Procurement Department to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 23% DBE goal was established for this procurement. Northeast Ohio Trenching Service, Inc. has agreed to achieve 10.18% DBE participation under the contract using the following certified DBE firms. Northeast Ohio Trenching Services also submitted documentation that demonstrated sufficient good faith effort had been made to achieve the 23% DBE participation goal.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a contract for customer satisfaction and community survey services and analyses for a period of one year with two, one-year options.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority is seeking the services of professional surveying firms that specialize in developing, administering, collecting, and analyzing surveys and survey data. The Authority will administer quarterly customer satisfaction surveys and semi-annual community value surveys each year. The customer survey evaluates customer satisfaction on each Authority transit mode: Fixed Route Bus, Rail, Bus Rapid Transit, and Paratransit. The community survey canvasses the Authority's service area within Cuyahoga County to obtain data from the community related to perceptions of the Authority's performance and value. Survey analyses will result in updated scorecards, creation of report metrics, and performance documentation. This work will continue the Authority's culture of ownership, continuous improvement, and performance management by identifying and tracking measurable goals and success outcomes.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Request for Proposals ("RFP") was posted on the Authority's Procurement website and advertised in local newspapers. Fourteen (14) interested parties downloaded the solicitation, and three (3) proposals were received on November 4, 2022. After evaluation by a panel of Authority employees in accordance with established Procurement Department policies and procedures, the proposal of ETC Institute to provide survey services was determined to be the most advantageous to the Authority, price and all other factors considered. After negotiations, a contract amount not to exceed \$259,145.00 for a period of one year, and amounts not to exceed \$259,145.00 for each of the two option years, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$777,435.00, was agreed upon. This amount is approximately 7% above the estimate for this project.

A cost analysis has been performed, and the Procurement Department has determined the price to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/ DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 14% DBE goal was established for this procurement. ETC Institute has committed to achieving the DBE participation goal through the utilization of ANIK (Subcontinent Asianowned) in the amount of \$36,000.00 or 14%.

At the January 31, 2023 meeting of the Board of Trustees, GCRTA will seek approval to award a contract for renewal of Oracle software licenses, maintenance and support services.

Contract No. 2022-144 is for the annual renewal of the Oracle Enterprise Business Suite database and applications. These include Financial, Procurement and HR/Payroll applications, as well as, GCRTA applications that interface with Oracle database technology including HASTUS, Ultramain, Kronos, Riskmaster and various Trapeze products. The GCRTA purchased this financial software from Oracle Corporation in 1991. Oracle developed the Enterprise Business Suite for GCRTA on a proprietary basis and is the only source authorized to maintain the system.

Section 306.43(H)(3) of the Ohio Revised Code states that competitive bidding is not required when the expenditure is for a renewal or renegotiation of a lease or license for telecommunications or electronic data processing equipment, service or systems, or for the maintenance thereof as supplied by the original source or its successors or assigns. Since Oracle is the original installer of their software applications, this regulation applies.

Regulations allow GCRTA to negotiate with the provider of these proprietary software services. The attached resolution recommends contract award to Oracle America, Inc., at a negotiated amount, which is deemed fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Authority to renew an agreement for the annual software licenses, maintenance, and support of various Oracle EBS applications for a period of one year.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority has been utilizing Oracle technology and applications since 1995. Annual licenses, maintenance and support are required to maintain the Oracle Enterprise Business Suite Financials, Procurement, and HR/Payroll applications, as well as, applications that interface with Oracle database technology. These applications include HASTUS, Ultramain, Kronos, Riskmaster and various Trapeze products. Oracle database technology and applications are proprietary products designed exclusively by Oracle America, Inc.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: This renewal contract for licenses, maintenance and support services is exempt from competitive bidding as authorized under Section 306.43(H)(3) of the Ohio Revised Code. Oracle America, Inc. developed the Enterprise Business Suite on a proprietary basis and is the only source authorized to maintain the system. After negotiations, Oracle America, Inc. offered to provide licenses, maintenance, and support for the various Oracle software products for a negotiated amount not to exceed \$611,960.83 for a one-year period. The Innovation and Technology Department reviewed the offer for adherence to technical scope.

A price analysis has been performed, and the Procurement Department has determined that the negotiated price is fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/ DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Actions have been met. A 0% DBE participation goal was established for this procurement because it is for the maintenance of proprietary software, where work is limited and exclusive to the original provider and installer by agreement.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This resolution will remove Section 644.09 Prior Service Credit from the Codified Rules and Regulations ("Code Book") of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority"), as duplicative of Personnel Policy 400.09 Prior Service Credit, and amend Personnel Policy 400.09.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Policies and Procedures of the Board of Trustees were codified in 1989, pursuant to Resolution 1989-176. The Code Book is undergoing a comprehensive review and update so that the Code Book will conform to the current structure and operations of the Authority.
