




Electronic Device Thefts/Robberies Jan – July


Quality of Life Crimes: Jan – July 3 Year Comparison

COVID-19 Response

- In March 2020 officers began reporting to five different locations
- Limited large group gatherings (Roll Call)
- Limited the number of partners assigned to each employee
- Limited vehicle access
- Provide officers with PPE (N95 masks, gloves, safety goggles, disinfectant spray and wipes)
- Used WebEx to conduct meetings
- Required masks as part of the GCRTA policy and State mandates
- To date only one member of the Transit Police Department has tested positive for COVID-19 (Dispatcher – Recovered and returned to work)

Homeless Initiative

- In March 2020, due to COVID-19, we noticed an increase in the number of homeless and mentally ill individuals on our system
- We assigned one of our detectives to work with local social service agencies to find a compassionate and non-criminal process to help these individuals
- With the assistance of our operators, our officers identified locations where we were experiencing the highest volume of homeless individuals that needed assistance
- Our partnership with the social service agencies resulted in numerous people receiving the care they needed

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY POLICE RELATIONS 2020




In order to strengthen the bond between communities and police, the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board developed standards for state and local law enforcement departments regarding:

- · The proper use of force including deadly force;
- · The recruiting, hiring and screening of potential law enforcement officer candidates;
- · The implementation of community engagement;
- The appropriate use of body worn cameras;
- The essential training for law enforcement telecommunicators;
- · The collection of data to demonstrate bias free policing; and
- · The investigation of employee misconduct.









- In 2021 the Ohio Collaborative will require that police departments meet additional requirements to maintain their certification.
- This includes a Bias Free Policing policy and training on Bias Based Profiling
- We have identified web based training that meets the requirements and we anticipate compliance with the new standards in the Fall of 2020

Use of Force

- Policy is thorough and in accordance with the Ohio Collaborative requirements
- All use of force incidents are reviewed for policy compliance
- Our policy prohibited neck restraints (February 16, 2019)
- We reviewed our policy in 2020 and made adjustments to address positional asphyxia and piling-on (June 22, 2020)
- We are in the process of identifying a vendor for body cameras and are working with the GCRTA executive team to identify funding
