West 30th Street Substation Rehabilitation

The West 30th St. Substation is located at 2334 W. 30th St, in Cleveland, OH. This project will provide a complete rehabilitation of the existing facility. Replacement work shall include but not be limited to the following; all existing switchgear, DC feeder cabling, 1.5 MW rectifier and the rectifier transformer.

West 30th Street Substation Rehabilitation Project Justification

- Substation legacy equipment is 1950's vintage
- The DC switchgear does not meet current safety standards
- Replacement parts for the switchgear and rectifier transformer are obsolete
- Modern substation equipment is more energy efficient
- The new substation will improve reliability and reduce maintenance costs

West 30th Street Substation Rehabilitation

Furnish and install the following new equipment:

- 1,615 kVA Oil Filled Rectifier Transformer (XFMR)
- 15 kV Load Break Switch
- 75 kVA House Power XFMR
- 1.5 MW Rectifier
- 15 kV AC Switchgear Lineup
- 600 VDC Switchgear Lineup

Background

- Codified in 1989 (Resolution 1989-176)
- In process of comprehensive review and update to bring policies in line with current operations
- Subject to review and revision every 3 years



Paratransit Code

- Meets federal definition of service area as being within ¾ mile of a local fixed route
- Maintains service for trips that are 5 miles or less for individuals beyond ¾ mile radius

Paratransit Code

- Grandfathers CRT riders born on or before December 31, 1931
- Complements fixed route network
- Eligibility determined in accordance with ADA
- Administrative procedures, including updated Paratransit Customer Handbook
