MEETING NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the following meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority will take place on <u>Tuesday, October 25, 2022</u> in the Board Room of the Authority, 1240 West Sixth Street, Cleveland, OH 44113 for consideration of the listed items and such other items that may properly come before the Board and be acted upon. This meeting will be live streamed on RTA's Board Page <u>www.RideRTA.com/board</u> via the meeting date for staff and members of the public. Members of the public may attend in person.

Based on Centers for Disease Control ("CDC") guidance to avoid crowded places where you cannot stay 6 feet away from others and Ohio Department of Public Health advice regarding congregating and social distancing, as well as RTA's interest in protecting community and employee health and safety, RTA Board Room and Meeting Room 1 capacity is limited to thirty-six (36) people to allow for social distancing. To accommodate members of the public, RTA will limit the number of staff permitted in the Board Room. All persons entering RTA's Main Office Building ("MOB") at 1240 West 6th Street are required to maintain a distance of six feet or more from other individuals who are not members of their family or household.

As a result of a federal court order on April 18, 2022, the CDC's January 29, 2021 order requiring masks on public transportation conveyances and at transportation hubs is no longer in effect. The CDC continues to recommend that people wear masks in indoor public transportation settings at this time. As a result, GCRTA recommends, but will not require, that members of the public wear a mask/face covering.

RTA Board of Trustees Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 9:05 a.m. There were six (6) board members present.

It was advised that notice of this meeting have been posted more than twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting, that the usual notification has been given the news media and other interested persons, and that all requirements of the Ohio Revised Code and Rules and Bylaws of this Board regarding notice of meeting have been complied with. President Lucas asked for a moment of silence for Board member Mayor Biasiotta who recently lost his father.

<u>Minutes</u>

President Lucas stated that the minutes from the August 16, 2022 Special Board Meeting and August 23, 2022 Board Meeting had been previously distributed and reviewed, and asked whether there were any additions and/or corrections. There were no corrections. The minutes were approved.

Public Comments – Agenda Items

- <u>Rev. Pinkney-Butts</u> The Superior Station is still not fixed. She asked for inclusivity of other issues in East Cleveland. The E. 79th Street Station is old. She was not present for the committee report out on the Code Book agenda items. Operators are not getting communication about the agenda items.
- 2. <u>Larry Rodriquez</u> Paratransit scheduling wait times are long. Schedulers hang up on him. The wait time for dispatchers is 45 minutes to one hour.
- <u>Chris Stocking (web form)</u> Thank you for adding route #35. After NextGen was completed, parts of the eastside, like East 123rd Street lost service, but #35 has restored this service. I have two suggestions to improve route #35 at no cost.
 - 1. Right now, #35 runs every 45 minutes, this does not connect well to make transfers at Windermere where many routes run every 30 minutes.
 - 2. After service cuts and fare increases took effect in August 2016, service south of Severance in Cleveland Heights was discontinued. This was before the MetroHealth Cleveland Heights Clinic was opened there. Patients are not able to access this clinic easily on RTA that live south of Severance.

I have looked at the #35 schedule and think it could be extended south on Taylor Road to Chagrin-Lee to improve access to MetroHealth Cleveland Heights. RTA can do this at no cost by reducing service to hourly. Although hourly service is not ideal, it will create better bus connections at Windermere and allow better access to Severance. That is a win. Could you forward this request to Service Management to evaluate and report back to the board? Thank you for your attention to this matter. Feel free to contact me with any questions.

Committee Reports

Dr. Caver reported on behalf of Mayor Biasiotta's Organizational, Services & Performance Monitoring Committee. Mr. Ryan of Western Reserve Coach Sales is present. A paratransit vehicle is outside for touring. He's worked with staff on the paratransit bus project. They are a diamond coach dealer. The coach is built in Kansas. They are a fiberglass honeycomb body manufacturer built on Ford and Chevrolet chassis. They have experience in the RTA and private sector. Their buses are sold and distributed nationally. The fiberglass construction has no metal, so it is conducive to Cleveland winters. You won't see the rust and corrosion. The chassis is lighter for a better ride. They added the MORryde suspension. The buses will be in next summer.

Mr. Garofoli announced that the next meeting of the Audit Committee to review IA quarterly work is November 3, 2022.

Ms. Moss added that this was discussed in committee. It's moving these policies from one document to another. Ms. Burney noted that the changes are not a deletion, but simply a cleaning up of redundancies in the Code Book, Personnel Policies and Bylaws.

J. 2022-93 – Removing Sections 628.05 Housing Allowance, 642.05 Employment at Will, 642.06 Employee Selection, 642.07 Employment of Relatives and 642.08 Employment Eligibility Verification, from the Codified Rules and Regulations of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority as duplicates of the Personnel Policies, the adoption of which was moved by Ms. McCall, seconded by Ms. Pellot and approved by unanimous vote.

President Lucas asked for an update from Chief Jones on the Transit Ambassador Program. Chief Jones said the Transit Ambassadors are getting positive feedback. They are doing a hop on/hop off technique on the HealthLine where they talk to the patrons in teams. One ambassador was able to assist a customer that was having a medical emergency. Request have been made for more ambassadors and to expand their territory to other areas.

Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Kay Sutula, Director of the Office of Management & Budget gave the report on behalf of Rajan Gautam, Deputy General Manager of Finance and Secretary-Treasurer. The U.S. unemployment rate dropped from 3.6% in June to 3.5% in July. Ohio's unemployment rate has remained steady at 3.9%. The county unemployment is not seasonally adjusted which causes the increase. The Bureau of Labor Statistics does not have any updated data for the State and County for August.

Over the past three years the height of the labor force was February 2020 due to the pandemic. After the pandemic we are back to pre-COVID unemployment levels for the five major Metropolitan Statistical Areas in Ohio. For July, unemployment rates for Cleveland are 5.4% down from 5.5%. Cincinnati is 3.4% up from 3.3%. Columbus at 3.3% up from 3.2%. Dayton at 3.8% up from 3.7%. Toledo remains unchanged at 3.9%. August ridership was 19.8% above August 2021 levels and YTD ridership is 19% above 2021. Increases are showing healthy gains compared to the 2021 levels. We are currently in a new contract transitioning from Passport to Masabi for the purchase of fares.

Passenger fares are 16.7% lower than August 2021 and 19.5% lower than budget. YTD they are 17.5% higher than the same period in 2021. Sales tax for September 2022 is 5.7% lower than September 2021 and 7.6% lower than budget. YTD receipts are 6.8% higher than 2021. Sixteen of the 23 categories were positive for September. Motor vehicles/watercraft are 3.0% lower. Online sales were 33.3% higher. Regular/Statewide sales were 7.0% higher. Ms. Moss asked why passenger fares are down. Ms. Sutula said this is due to the transition from Passport to Masabi. Passport provided daily revenue. Masabi is a month in arrears.

General Manager/CEO Report

India L. Birdsong Terry, General Manager, CEO gave the report. Staff attended the TRAC competitive grant hearing, September 14, 2022. Funding requests were made for the Light Rail Track Replacement and 25Connects/MetroHealth Line BRT project. Funding decisions will be announced this December. NOACA was also present. Staff hosted a Legislative Update for several Cuyahoga County state delegation members, September 16, 2022 at the Main Office. Updates included upcoming projects, current state funding and next year's state budget. The installation of the new Transit Ambassadors and Crisis Intervention Specialist was held September 2 at the Main Office. They begin work on the HealthLine and Red Line September 6.

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The RTA Cleans Program launched back in June. Cleaning includes interior of buses: high touch points, windows, doors, removal of trash, deodorizing, etc. RTA employees received service pins and certificates for milestones years (5 years to 40 years) of service, September 7 at the Main Office. RTA participated in the City of Cleveland Senior Day, September 15. RTA distributed promo bags to the attendees. GM, CEO Birdsong Terry participated in Trinity Cathedral Sunday Forum, September 11. Topics included transportation access, fare equity and operating beyond traditional expectations. In recognition of Hispanic Heritage Month, RTA placed Hispanic/LatinX diaspora country flags at W. 25th Street Station and on bus stop signs along the Clark-Fulton route. Several staff members were a part of the team to make this project possible. Ms. McCall congratulated the staff and suggested we do the same for other special cultural celebrations.

Mr. Feliciano reported that Latinos in Transit was created in 2016. He will attend their leadership conference in Dallas, TX. The group has been growing along with their collaboration with other national groups like APTA and COMTO. Board member Luz N. Pellot and Paratransit Reservationist Operator, Pablo Santiago were honored as 100+ Latinos Cleveland Must Know 2022 Cohort.

RTA's DE&I team created a short film entitled "From Ashes to Beauty: Art, Transportation & Place Making" as part of the "We Wear the Mask" project. It aired at the Atlas Shaker Square, September 18 during the Greater Cleveland Urban Film Festival. The film highlighted the partnership with Elevate the East and the importance of art and public transit. Ms. McCall congratulated the team. She was one of the founding members of the Elevate the East 93rd group. She added that the collaboration was started to include more art in the ward and to be connected to the Burten, Bell, Carr, Bell Development area. The connectivity to the E. 93 / E. 105 transit project is important. She asked that the film be shown at the next Elevate meeting.

President's Report

President Lucas thanked the "We Wear the Mask" committee. He participated in the 11th District Labor Day parade. He thanked Chief Jones for allowing him to parade with the Transit Police during several special events.

Public Comments

- <u>Rev. Pinkney-Butts</u> She wants a conversation with the public and the police. She wants
 people of color in the media and communications department. She doesn't see fairness for
 people of color in the media at RTA. There needs to be more personnel empowerment. She
 asked if there are issues with transitioning to EZfare. There was no vote on the NextGen title.
 She asked for a more open line of communication with personnel, staff and public.
- Loh Kudos for RTA for leading. Cleveland was selected for a national study. RTA designated some advocates to lead the survey. Riders should have input on the rail cars and fixed route buses.
- 3. <u>Evan O'Reilly</u> He represents Northern Ohioans for Budget Legislation Equality (NOBLE). He's met with several board members about paratransit service. NOBLE conducted a survey on the service in the spring. He requested to get on the agenda to share the survey results.
- 4. <u>Airric Stewart</u> He said there is a change to the call-in format. In previous meetings he could hear the meeting in the background while waiting to be cued up. He repeated his proposal for restoring service on the #15. RTA works for the public.

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5. <u>Sherita Montgomery</u> – She asked about the watercraft tax mentioned by Ms. Sutula. She is in favor of the #15 route proposal mentioned by Mr. Stewart. She lives in Ward 1. The proposal is good for the community.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This resolution will allow the Authority to enter into a contract for the furnishing of motorcoach filters, as specified and as required, for a period of two years.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: This contract for motorcoach filters is required for the furnishing of various engine filters for multiple bus fleets across the Authority. They are used in general maintenance to help ensure longevity of the coaches and to assist in providing safe and reliable transportation.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Invitation for Bids ("IFB") was posted on the GCRTA Procurement web site and advertised in the local newspapers. Eighteen interested parties downloaded the solicitation. Five responsive bids were received on September 14, 2022. The bid of Vehicle Maintenance Program has been determined by the Procurement Department to be the lowest responsive bid from a responsible bidder. A bid summary is included under Attachment A.

A price analysis has been performed and the Procurement Department has determined the price to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 0% DBE goal was established for this procurement due to the lack of certified DBE firms.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This procurement will be funded through the General Fund, Fleet Management Department budget, in an amount not to exceed \$134,900.00, for the two-year period. This total amount is approximately 26% above the estimate of \$101,029.00.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: <u>Reject this offer</u>. Rejection of this offer would impact the Authority's ability to maintain and safely operate the Authority's motorcoach vehicles.
- 8.0 RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the bid of Vehicle Maintenance Program be accepted and the resolution passed authorizing the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer to enter into a contract.

642.10 REDUCTION IN WORKFORCE.

(a) The CEO/General Manager is responsible for ensuring the efficient management and financial well-being of the Authority. Accordingly, the CEO/General Manager is authorized to recommend and/or initiate a reduction in force.

(b) A reduction in force means a permanent loss of employment due to a layoff from the position held by an employee or the abolishment of a position held by an employee.

(c) The CEO/General Manager or his or her designee shall execute the necessary actions in the implementation of this policy that are related to non-bargaining personnel practices. (Res. 2001-119, Passed 8-21-01.)

642.11 WORKFORCE ACCOMMODATION.

(a) As a part of its vision to provide outstanding transit services and make an important contribution to the community, the Authority is committed to its employees. We strive to create a culture that encourages employees to actively engage in process improvements and perform at their highest capacity. As our vision becomes our way of doing business, implementing process improvements will change our organization's structure. In the event job duties are eliminated as a result of process improvements or new technology, the Authority is committed to making its best efforts to provide continued employment for affected employees. These employees are expected to be partners with the Authority in developing new skills and performing new job duties.

(b) This policy is not intended to address the needs of employees with performance deficiencies or to apply to any reduction in workforce or realignment due to adverse economic conditions.

642.12 TRANSITIONAL/ALTERNATIVE WORK.

(a) A transitional/alternative work placement program may be offered to all full-time employees who may become disabled during employment with the Authority. Transitional work is a temporary work task that fits the parameters of ability as determined by the employee's medical condition. Alternative work is the placement of a disabled employee in a new job classification due to permanent medical restrictions.

(b) The CEO/General Manager shall implement the necessary administrative procedures to carry out this policy.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: The resolution seeks board approval of an Option Agreement with Flaherty & Collins Development, LLC ("FC") for the proposed purchase of Cuyahoga County Permanent Parcel Number 001-32-012 on Detroit Avenue, Cleveland, OH, located adjacent to the West Boulevard-Cudell Red Line Rapid Transit Station. This Option Agreement will allow the developer to make application to the State of Ohio for project financing and initiate a development process for a residential transit-oriented development ("TOD") project. This option to purchase and the proposed sale will remove excess real property from GCRTA's real property inventory and promote TOD on vacant land.
- DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: GCRTA acquired this property from the City of Cleveland in 2.0 1975 via the Mass Transit System Transfer Agreement of 1975 which transferred the assets of the Cleveland Transit System to the GCRTA. The site offered for sale is vacant land and has been listed on GCRTA's Excess Real Property Inventory and Utilization Plan since 2016. Sale of this property will not adversely affect rail operations and will promote a TOD project immediately adjacent to a busy rail station.

A residential TOD was determined to be the highest and best use for this excess property and will promote the TOD and economic development goals of the GCRTA. The TOD project will enhance the value of the existing real estate assets at the West Boulevard-Cudell Rapid Transit Station.

FC intends to develop a 60-to-80-unit affordable housing project on this 1.37-acre site.

GCRTA set the option price after a review of current option fee market pricing for this type of transaction, size of the parcel, and the proposed option term. During the initial option period. FC will prepare and apply for project financing to the State of Ohio to secure tax credit financing to develop the TOD project. As a requirement for the financing submittal, FC will need to demonstrate site control of the parcel. An option agreement with GCRTA will satisfy this financing application requirement.

This proposed option agreement will not inhibit the operation of the West Boulevard-Cudell Rapid Transit Station and will promote the TOD and economic development goals of the GCRTA.

FC is a nationally known developer of multi-family housing projects based in Indianapolis, Indiana with both experience and current development activity in northeast Ohio.

This resolution only seeks to authorize an option to purchase agreement with FC. Additional Board authorization will be required to authorize execution of a Purchase and Sale Agreement, if it is determined to be in the best interest of GCRTA for the sale of the parcel to proceed.

- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 4.0 DBE/AFFIRMATIVE ACTION BACKGROUND: Does not apply.

WHEREAS, it was determined that a residential multi-family Transit Oriented Development ("TOD") project is an appropriate use for the Property, compatible with the TOD and economic development goals of GCRTA and is consistent with the Real Estate Policies of the GCRTA; and

WHEREAS, Flaherty & Collins Development, LLC ("FC") has successfully developed residential TOD projects nationally and in northeast Ohio and intends to develop a TOD project on the Property; and

WHEREAS, a residential TOD was determined to be the highest and best use for the Property in accordance with current TOD goals and objectives; and

WHEREAS, GCRTA intends to cooperate with FC to plan and develop the TOD by offering the Option Agreement, assisting with entitlement, supporting the efforts of FC to finance the TOD project, and offering other appropriate TOD services; and

WHEREAS, the Option Agreement will initiate the development process, allowing FC to apply for tax credit financing from the State of Ohio and will demonstrate site control of the Property by FC necessary for the financing application submittal during the term of the agreement.



OPTION AGREEMENT

This Option Agreement ("Option Agreement") is entered into as of ______, 2022 ("Effective Date") by and between the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, a political subdivision of the State of Ohio, 1240 West 6th Street, Cleveland, Ohio 44113 ("Seller"), and Flaherty & Collins Development, LLC, an Indiana limited liability company (together with its permitted successors, assigns, and/or designees, "Buyer") (collectively, "the Parties), entered into under the authority of Seller's Resolution No. ______ a copy of which is attached to and incorporated into this Agreement as <u>Exhibit A</u>.

<u>Recitals</u>

WHEREAS, Seller owns an approximate 1.37 acre parcel of real estate (Parcel No. 001-32-012) located adjacent to the West Boulevard-Cudell Rapid Transit Station on Detroit Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio 44102 and more particularly described on <u>Exhibit B</u> attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, Seller and Buyer desire to set forth the terms under which Buyer has the option to acquire the Property.

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration received, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Basic Transaction
 - a) <u>Purchase Terms</u>. The Seller wishes to sell and the Buyer wishes to purchase the Property (as hereinafter defined) in its "As Is" condition. The Parties shall negotiate an agreement for purchase of the Property ("Purchase Agreement") that shall contain the basic terms contained in this Option Agreement and other terms and conditions to be negotiated between the Parties.
 - b) <u>Purchase Price</u>. The Buyer shall pay the purchase price as determined by an appraisal and appraisal review prior to the closing of the property.
 - c) <u>Air Rights</u>. Air Rights will be acquired separately from the City of Cleveland, as the City retained the air rights to all of the real estate (including this Property) transferred as part of the Mass Transit System Transfer Agreement, dated September 5, 1975, which transferred the assets of the Cleveland Transit System to the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority. The Seller will make its best efforts to support Buyer in obtaining the Air Rights. Seller's previous experiences with obtaining such Air Rights from the City have been positive.

2. Option

a) <u>Grant of Option</u>. Seller hereby grants to Buyer and Buyer hereby accepts from Seller, the exclusive, irrevocable right and option to purchase the

Property, together with the improvements located thereon and all rights, privileges, easements and appurtenances thereto, on the terms and conditions set forth herein (the "Purchase Option").

- b) <u>Option Period</u>. The Seller shall grant Buyer the Purchase Option for an initial period of twelve (12) months commencing on the Effective Date (the "Initial Option Period"); provided however, Buyer shall have one (1) option to extend the Initial Option Period for an additional twelve (12) months (the "Extended Option Period" and together with the Initial Option Period, collectively, the "Option Period").
- c) Option Price. Buyer shall pay to Seller the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the Purchase Option (the "Option Price"). The Buyer shall pay the Option Price to Seller within ten (10) days of Buyer's receipt of a fully executed original of this Option Agreement authorized by Seller's Board of Trustees. In the event Buyer elects to extend the Initial Option Period, Buyer shall provide Seller written notice of its election to extend and Buyer shall remit to Seller the additional sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) no later than the expiration date of the Initial Option Period.
- d) <u>Effect of Option Price on Purchase</u>. The Seller shall not refund the Option Price to Buyer unless a refund is required as set forth in Section 5b.
- e) <u>Notice of Exercise; Purchase Agreement</u>. In the event Buyer desires to exercise the Purchase Option, Buyer shall give written notice of such exercise to Seller and the Parties shall thereupon proceed to execute and deliver the Purchase Agreement and to consummate the transaction in accordance with the terms and conditions contained therein. Closing of such transaction shall occur in accordance with the terms of the Purchase Agreement.
- f) Notice to Buyer that Approval of Sale by FTA and Seller's Board of Trustees is Required. Buyer expressly acknowledges that the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and Seller's Board of Trustees must approve the sale of the Property. Seller and Buyer are entering into this Option Agreement with the understanding that, even if Buyer exercises the Purchase Option, the Seller may be unable to complete the sale if FTA and/or Seller's Board of Trustees do not approve the sale.

3. **Inspections.** During the Option Period, provided Seller has received and acknowledged receipt of the Option Price and received Buyer's evidence of insurance required by Section 14 herein, Seller shall provide Buyer and/or Buyer's agents and representatives access to enter upon the Property for the purpose of making such inspections of the Property as Buyer, in Buyer's sole discretion, deems necessary and/or desirable. Said inspections may include, without limitation, such environmental tests, audits and inspections and such soil borings, samples and tests and surveying and engineering studies, and other inspections of the Property as Buyer, in Buyer's sole discretion, deems necessary. Buyer shall coordinate with and secure approval from

Seller in advance of entering the Property as certain safety parameters or procedures may be required since the Red Line Rapid adjacent to the Property is an operating rail transit system. The Parties may enter into a temporary right of entry agreement to allow Buyer and its consultants access to the Property. Buyer shall give Seller reasonable advance written notice of each entry specifying the nature and purpose of the inspection and the duration of the entry. Buyer shall immediately provide Seller copies of any and all reports of inspections and tests requested by Seller. Buyer shall restore or repair the Property as nearly as practicable to essentially the same condition as it was in prior to its inspections upon completion of Buyer's inspection, including but not limited to the land, underground utilities, fixtures, or other structures. Buyer shall provide evidence at the time of signing this Option Agreement that Buyer has adequate insurance coverage for this obligation as outlined in Section 14 herein.

4. Title and Survey

- a) <u>Title Insurance</u>
 - (1) Buyer shall obtain a preliminary title commitment or "binder" in respect of the Property (with special tax and lien search) (the "Title Commitment") issued by the Title Company (as hereinafter defined). Buyer shall either:

(i) approve the form and substance of the Title Commitment, or

- (ii) reject it.
- (2) Buyer may, at Buyer's option:
 - accept such title as Seller furnishes upon the Closing Date and any encumbrances on the Premises, shall be "Permitted Exceptions;" or
 - (ii) terminate this Option Agreement.
- (3) Upon termination of this Option Agreement pursuant to this subsection, neither party hereto shall thereafter be under any further liability or obligation to the other party hereunder except as otherwise provided herein.
- b) <u>Survey</u>
- (1) Buyer, at Buyer expense, may obtain a metes and bounds survey of the Property (the "Survey"). The Survey shall be in a form and substance satisfactory to Buyer, the Title Company and any lender of Buyer. The Survey shall also contain a certificate, in a form and substance acceptable to Buyer, certifying to Buyer, the Title Company, any lender of Buyer, and others designated by Buyer, that the Survey is an accurate representation of the Property made in accordance with the "Minimum Standard Detail Requirements for Land Title Surveys" adopted by the ALTA/ACSM and shall include the location of all structures and improvements on the Property and the identification of all easements and rights-of-way, either of record or visible on the ground, which either benefit or burden the Property.

- (2) Buyer shall either:
 - (i) notify Seller in writing of Buyer's approval of the Survey; or
 - (ii) notify Seller in writing of any matters shown (or not shown) on the Survey that are objectionable to Buyer (said matters, together, herein called the "Survey Defects").
- (3) In the event that Buyer so notifies Seller of any such Survey Defects, Seller shall have a period of ten (10) days after receipt of such notice to cure or remove all such Survey Defects, but Seller shall not be obligated to cure or remove such Survey Defects. If Seller has not cured or removed all such Survey Defects to Buyer's satisfaction within said ten (10) day period, then Buyer may:
 - accept title to the Property notwithstanding the existence of any such Survey Defects upon the Closing Date in which case the Survey Defects shall be deemed to be Permitted Exceptions;
 - (ii) grant Seller, at Seller's request, additional time in which to cure any such Survey Defects; or
 - (iii) terminate this Option Agreement. Upon termination of this Option Agreement pursuant to this subsection, neither party hereto shall thereafter be under any further liability or obligation to the other party hereunder except as otherwise provided herein.
- (4) If Buyer fails to deliver written notice of its election under subsection
 (3), above, prior to the expiration of the Survey Cure Period, then
 Buyer shall be deemed to have elected item (i) above.

5. Closing Date and Possession.

- a) <u>Closing Date</u>. The closing of the acquisition of the Property (the "Closing Date") shall occur within thirty (30) days after the later of:
 - (1) the Parties' execution of the Purchase Agreement;
 - (2) Seller's Board of Trustees approval of the sale; or
 - (3) the Federal Transit Administration (if it then has any interest in the Property) concurrence with the sale.
- b) <u>Effect of Disapproval</u>. In the event that the Seller's Board of Trustees does not approve the sale and/or the Federal Transit Administration does not approve the sale, then Buyer shall immediately receive the return of the Option Price.
- <u>Possession</u>. The Buyer may possess the Property on the Closing Date. The above notwithstanding, the Parties may agree in writing upon another date.

6. <u>Title Commitment and Escrow Agent</u>. The title company and escrow agent for the transaction contemplated in the Purchase Agreement shall be Northern Title Agency, Inc. (the "Title Company").

7. <u>Purchase Agreement</u>. During the Option Period, the Parties shall begin negotiating in good faith to reach a written Purchase Agreement containing comprehensive representations, warranties, disclosures, indemnities, conditions and agreements.

8. <u>Exclusive Dealing</u>. During the Option Period, Seller shall not negotiate with any other person or entity relating to the acquisition or lease of the Property, in whole or in part.

9. <u>Notices</u>. Any notice which may be or is required to be given pursuant to the provisions of this Option Agreement shall be personally delivered, sent by certified or registered mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, or by overnight delivery service and addressed as follows.

The Parties may change the contact information within this Section by written communication in lieu of Amendment to this Agreement.

10. <u>Agreement for Further Execution</u>. Prior to, at and after the Closing Date (as defined in the Purchase Agreement), the Parties shall also each execute and deliver to the other such other instruments of conveyance, sale, assignment or transfer and shall take or cause to be taken such other or further action as the Parties shall reasonably request at any time or from time to time in order to:

- (a) vest, confirm or evidence in Buyer title to all or part of the Property; or
- (b) effectuate, in any other manner, the terms and conditions of this Option Agreement.

11. <u>Authority</u>. Each person and entity signing on behalf of a party to this Option Agreement individually warrants his or her and its authority so to do and individually warrants that all necessary actions have been taken to authorize the execution of this Option Agreement by such party.

12. <u>Real Estate Brokers' Commissions</u>. In the Purchase Agreement, Seller and Buyer will represent and warrant to each other that such Parties have had no dealings with any real estate broker to any commission in connection with the sale of the Property to Buyer.

13. **Expenses.** The Parties shall pay the expenses of such party's own accountants, attorneys and others engaged in such party's behalf in connection with this Option Agreement, the transactions contemplated hereby, and the Purchase Agreement to be entered into between the Parties.

14. <u>Insurance</u>. Buyer shall indemnify Seller for any injury or harm directly or indirectly resulting from Buyer's inspections conducted on the Property pursuant to this Option Agreement. Buyer shall provide upon execution of this Option Agreement evidence of commercial liability insurance covering Buyer's operation with minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Said insurance shall include contractual liability. Seller shall be made an additional insured on said insurance policy. The foregoing indemnity shall not include damage incurred by Seller as a result of Buyer's discovery of environmental or other conditions upon the Property which predate this Option Agreement.

15. **Survival.** Sections 2, 12 and 14 shall survive termination or expiration of this Option Agreement and they shall take precedence over all other terms of this Option Agreement to the extent of conflict. No expiration or earlier termination provision in this Option Agreement shall have any effect on the survival of these sections or on any terms stated to or intended to survive termination of this Option Agreement.

18. **Construction.** Each Party hereto acknowledges that it was represented by counsel and participated equally in the drafting and negotiation of this Option Agreement and that, accordingly, no court construing this Option Agreement shall construe it more stringently against one Party than against the other.


