The meeting was called to order at 10:57 a.m. There were eight (8) Board members present.

It was advised that notice of this meeting had been posted more than twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting, that the usual notification had been given the news media and other interested persons, and that all requirements of the Ohio Revised Code and Rules and Bylaws of this Board regarding notice of meeting had been complied with.

Minutes

President Lucas stated that the minutes from the October 31, 2023 Board Meeting had been previously distributed and reviewed, and asked whether there were any additions and/or corrections. There were no corrections. It was moved and seconded. The minutes were approved.

Introduction of Resolutions:

Resolution 2023-85 was introduced early in the agenda.

A. 2023-85 - Appointment of eleven members to the Community Advisory Committee, the adoption of which was moved by Mayor Biasiotta, seconded by Ms. McPherson and approved by unanimous vote.

Eight of the eleven (11) CAC appointed members were in attendance. They all took an oath of office.

Public Comments – Agenda Items

- 1. <u>Lenny Stover</u> Lenny opposes Resolution 2023-94. Lenny believes the Red Line Greenway should be preserved and a land bridge should not be built. Volunteers worked to keep the Greenway a place to be enjoyed. A bridge could be built on Fulton Road.
- 2. <u>Airric Stewart</u> (caller) Airric sent an email requesting some routes be reinstated. He also sent emails to the new Board members. He hasn't heard back from them. He suggested numbers be shared along with percentages from the TRACTION report earlier.
- 3. <u>Chris Martin</u> (caller) Chris is concerned about safety while waiting for transit and while riding transit. More frequent service could address this issue. CPT suggested a public facing database for transparency. He congratulated the new CAC members.

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- 4. <u>Laura McShane</u> (webform) I am asking the RTA board to reject the proposed "carte blanche" amendment to the 2021 DUA with the Marons and to terminate this shady deal forever. RTA board: please prioritize the renovation of the W 25th Station by providing pedestrian access to the train platform from the Metroparks' Red Line Greenway trail* and commit to save the wildlife habitat slated for senseless destruction. honor the legacy of Stan Adams, Pete Presson, Dutch Harley and Rotary volunteers led by Lennie Stover. (*this is possible because it is used at E34 and E79)
- 5. <u>Sam McNulty</u> (webform) The Scottish poet Alexander Smith wisely said, "A man doesn't plant a tree for himself. He plants it for posterity."

I've visited Ohio City with my parents and six siblings since the 1970s, and in the last 22 years I've lived, worked, and played in this great neighborhood. My business partners and I have renovated 140,000 square feet of vacant properties in Ohio City, opened 6 businesses, and have created over 200 well-paying jobs in the neighborhood. We recently built 7 transit-oriented townhomes on a vacant property in the adjacent Duck Island neighborhood. In other words, I'm very much in favor of dense, urban development. This is why I studied Urban Planning and Real Estate Development at CSU's Urban Studies College. It was there that I learned that dense transit-oriented development only works when it is balanced with publicly accessible green space.

I write today to express my strong opposition to the development of the RTA-owned land adjacent to the Metroparks Redline Greenway. The sale of publicly owned green space - indeed, one that includes a protected wetland - to private for-profit developers is not in the best interests of taxpayers and the quality of life of the surrounding neighborhoods. I've watched thick clouds of migrating monarchs hovering over this narrow stretch of wooded habitat. And the migrating tropical forest songbirds and ruby-throated hummingbirds that visit in spring and fall are a sight to behold.

The forested habitat along the Metroparks will be enjoyed by Clevelanders of all walks of life. The Western Reserve Land Conservancy could step in and purchase this urban forest from RTA and permanently protect it from development so that it can forever be part of the growing Cleveland Metroparks Emerald Necklace. Posterity will thank us.

Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Rajan D. Gautam, Deputy General Manager of Finance and Secretary-Treasurer gave the report. In June 2022, the rate of inflation hit 9.1%. Since then, it has been on a steady decline. At the end of October 2023, inflation came in at 3.2% lower than the 3.7% in September 2023. The Federal Reserve raised interest rates again back in July to 5.5%. The Federal Open Market Committee met on Nov. 1. They decided to keep the target rate at 5.5%. They are scheduled to meet December 13 to discuss further interest rate action. Interest rates are at the highest level in 22 years.

Ridership data goes back to pre-Pandemic levels in 2019 at 27.06 million rides. YTD through 2023, we have 18.22 million rides. That is 8.84 million rides lower or 32.7%. October ridership was up 14% when compared to October 2022. October passenger fare revenue was 53.5% below October 2022. This is a result of timing. Student fare cards revenue received in October 2022 accounted for that decline. YTD passenger fares in 2019 were 32.39 million. YTD through October 2023, it is 22.93 million which is 9.46 million lower or 29.2%. Sales tax receipts remain strong. YTD sales tax is up 3%, nearly \$7 million higher than 2022. Fifteen of the 23 categories were positive in November 2023 compared to November 2022. Online sales were 8.1% higher. Regular and statewide sales were 2.9% higher. Motor vehicles and watercraft were 8.3% lower.

General Manager/CEO Report

India L. Birdsong Terry, General Manager, CEO gave the report. GCRTA veterans were recognized Nov. 6-11 with videos, a marketing campaign, a panel discussion, new resource group, City of Cleveland event and a special pin. The new EngageRTA webpage launches today. The page was created to receive special event requests and services. GM/CEO Birdsong Terry will be honored by the YWCA as one of their Women of Achievement on May 30, 2024 at Severance Hall. RTA celebrated National Apprenticeship Week, November 13-19. RTA has a bus mechanic and rail mechanic apprenticeship programs and an Operator Mentoring program.

The Operator Mentoring Program, Positive Impact – celebrated those who recently went through the program on November 17. RTA hosted ATU International representatives, FTA and the Transportation Learning Center. Several transit systems' training divisions were in attendance. T-shirts for RTA's Employee Resource groups are in the design form. Elevating Women Together, Latinos Unidos and Pride are among the resource groups. The Holiday Trolley will run from Nov. 18 – Dec. 17. The trolley will make appearances at several community events. Holiday District Visits started Nov. 16 and will run through Dec. 20.

Public Comments – public transit related items

1. <u>Loh</u> – Loh was late today's due to the snow resulting in buses being slow. Loh rides the #9. Two scheduled buses did not show up. This route was reduced to a 30-minute frequency. The system redesign covered businesses, healthcare and retail, but doesn't cover all residential areas. Loh is unhoused. Loh suggested text service alerts be used again and shelter locations be reviewed.

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- 2. <u>Abigail</u> Abigail represents TK Elevator. She asked for more information on why Schindler was chosen for this contract. Ms. Dangelo will speak with her after the meeting.
- 3. <u>Airric Stewart</u> (caller) Airric is still having issues with the survey line. He requested it be fixed. He asked the staff and CAC to experience traveling in inclement weather such as today and question why the 15A is still not back in service.
- 4. <u>Chris Martin</u> (caller) Chris' plan is to solve the operator shortage, increase ridership, and create more safety and security. He hasn't seen any action to advance the Strategic Plan and Climate Action Plan goals.
- 5. Samuel Hutchins (webform) I would like to be a member of your board.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a revenue-generating contract for transit and shelter advertising sales for a period of five years with two, one-year options for renewal.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority desires to maximize revenue-generating opportunities by combining two existing revenue-generating programs that are both established and beneficial to the Authority: transit and shelter advertising sales. Proposals were sought from qualified advertising firms with experience in transit advertising markets. The selected firm will generate revenue for the Authority from the sale of transit and shelter advertising media. The selected vendor will also service and maintain the transit and shelter advertising space.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Request for Proposals ("RFP") was posted on the Authority's Procurement website and advertised in local newspapers. Fourteen interested parties downloaded the solicitation, and three proposals were received on October 6, 2023. After evaluation by a panel of Authority employees in accordance with established Procurement Department policies and procedures, the proposal of HFT Management, Inc., dba Gateway Outdoor Advertising, to provide transit and shelter advertising sales, was determined to be the most advantageous to the Authority, guaranteed revenue and all other factors considered. HFT Management, Inc., dba Gateway Outdoor Advertising, will pay a minimum annual guarantee ("MAG") to the Authority for each contract year, as shown below, and a 65% revenue share for any revenue exceeding the MAG.

A revenue analysis has been performed, and the Procurement Department has determined the MAG and revenue sharing proposal to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/ DBE BACKGROUND: The Office of Business Development does not conduct Affirmative Action reviews or establish DBE goals on revenue generated agreements.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: The Authority will be paid the MAG annually. The exact revenue amount is directly dependent upon the amount of advertising sales revenue generated. Funds will be deposited into the General Fund.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: <u>Reject this offer</u>. Rejection of this offer would deny the Authority the economic benefits of transit and shelter advertising revenue.
- 8.0 RECOMMENDATION: This procurement was discussed by the Board of Trustees at the December 5, 2023 Organizational, Services & Performance Monitoring Committee meeting. It is recommended that the offer of HFT Management, Inc., dba Gateway Outdoor Advertising, be accepted and the resolution passed authorizing the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer to enter into a contract.

AUTHORIZING CONTRACT NO. 2023-115 WITH HFT MANAGEMENT, INC., DBA GATEWAY OUTDOOR ADVERTISING, TO PROVIDE TRANSIT AND SHELTER ADVERTISING SALES FOR A PERIOD OF FIVE YEARS WITH TWO, ONE-YEAR OPTIONS (REVENUE-GENERATING, AMOUNT VARIABLE BASED UPON NET SALES)

WHEREAS, the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") permits the sale of advertising space on certain specified transit vehicles, shelters, and property; and

WHEREAS, the Authority desires to maximize the revenue generating opportunities at its disposal by the sale of transit-related advertising media; and

WHEREAS, transit and shelter advertising sales are available from HFT Management, Inc., dba Gateway Outdoor Advertising, headquartered in New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer deems the offer of HFT Management, Inc., dba Gateway Outdoor Advertising, as negotiated, to be in the best interest of the Authority and recommends acceptance thereof by the Board of Trustees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, Cuyahoga County, Ohio:

Section 1. That the offer of HFT Management, Inc., dba Gateway Outdoor Advertising, to provide transit and shelter advertising sales for a period of five years with two, one-year options be and the same is hereby accepted.

Section 2. - 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This resolution will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a contract to provide ruggedized tablets for non-revenue vehicles.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority's Transit Police operate a Computer Aided Dispatch and Automated Vehicle Locator ("CAD/AVL") software. The CAD/AVL, along with the Authority's radio system, allow the Transit Police dispatchers to communicate and track vehicles. Officers utilize the CAD/AVL on their computers to verify real-time data with the dispatchers to help improve situational awareness and improve speed and accuracy of field reporting.

The Authority's support departments, including Service Quality, Electronic Repair and Mobile Equipment Mechanics, play vital roles in keeping equipment and services running at safe and optimal levels. These departments utilize the CAD/AVL system to locate vehicles in service, view real-time data/communications, and to respond to urgent needs of the vehicles and passengers. For the CAD/AVL systems to function properly, the hardware and software must be maintained and operational. If one hardware/software component fails, it affects the system and, in many cases, causes the other areas of the system to fail.

The current devices are several years old and many of them are not rated for rugged/mobile usage, causing further system failures and repetitive maintenance. The Authority has identified a viable ruggedized solution to meet the needs of each of these departments. Replacing these devices will ensure the safety of our passengers, employees and vehicles, as well as maintain the highest level of our services possible.

3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Invitation for Bids ("IFB") was posted on the Authority's Procurement website and advertised in the local newspapers. Forty-one (41) interested parties, including potential subcontractors, downloaded the solicitation package. Six (6) bids were received and opened on October 12, 2023. Of those six (6) bids, there were two (2) responsive bids. They are as follows:

The Basis of Award is the lowest responsive bid from a responsible bidder for the Total Base Bid price. Baycom, Inc. was determined to be a responsible bidder. The Total Base Bid price of \$263,444.40 from Baycom, Inc. is 24.73% below the project estimate of \$349,995.00.

- A price analysis has been performed, and the bid of Baycom, Inc. has been determined by the Procurement Department to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

At the December 19, 2023 meeting of the Board of Trustees, GCRTA will seek approval to award a contract for Records Storage, Management and Destruction Services for a period of five years.

R.C. 306.43(H)(2) provides that competitive procedures are not required when the purchase consists of goods or services, or any combination thereof, and after reasonable inquiry the board or any officer or employee the board designates finds that only one source of supply is reasonably available.

The Authority has been using the proprietary storage services and technology of the same vendor for twenty-five (25) years. The Authority last competed this five-year service in 2013, at which time only one proposal was received. Since prior competitive procurements have demonstrated that the current vendor is the only vendor reasonably available to provide these services, the vendor has been determined to be a sole source.

Regulations allow GCRTA to negotiate with the sole source provider of these services. The attached resolution recommends contract award to Access Information Management Corporation to provide records storage, management, and destruction services for a period of five years, which is deemed fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a contract for records storage, management, and destruction services, as required, for a period of five (5) years.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: Laws and regulations require the Authority to maintain records for a specified length of time and to destroy records according to the Authority's records retention schedule. A record can be a file, blueprint or other form of documentation. The records storage center is used for storage of inactive and permanent paper records, secured records, and bulk storage. Currently, there are more than 11,300 containers in storage. It is impossible to maintain this volume of records within the Authority's offices due to space constraints, security concerns, and the environmental requirements needed to preserve these records. Therefore, having an off-site records storage facility is in the best interest of the Authority.

The services to be performed under this Contract include, but are not limited to, destruction and document scanning. The vendor provides a chain of custody with barcode scanning on all items traveling to and from the Authority. The Authority can consolidate pickups and deliveries, which provides cost savings and an added level of security. In addition to storage, Access Information Management Corporation will continue to scan and shred the records as part of the cataloging system to reduce costs for transportation to a scanning and shredding facility, as well as to maintain a chain of custody.

Access Information Management Corporation (formerly known as Retrievex, Inc. dba Access Information Management, Cintas Corporation and Andrews Records Management, Inc.) has successfully performed the Authority's records management services since 1998. In addition to the Authority, other current clients include the State of Ohio, Cleveland Clinic Foundation, Lincoln Electric and University Hospitals, among many others.

3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: This contract for records storage and services is exempt from competitive procedures, pursuant to R.C. 306.43(H)(2). Access Information Management Corporation offered to provide records storage, management, and destruction services, as required, at negotiated rates, in an amount not to exceed \$425,000.00 for a period of five (5) years.

The Authority last competed this service in 2013, at which time only one proposal was received. Since prior competitive procurements have demonstrated that the current vendor is the only vendor reasonably available to provide these proprietary services, the vendor has been determined to be a sole source.

A price analysis has been performed, and the Procurement Department has determined that the negotiated rates are fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. A 0% DBE goal was established for this procurement due to the lack of certified DBE firms.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: This procurement will permit the Authority to provide records storage, management, and destruction services, as required, in accordance with the Authority's Administrative Procedure No. 009 and Ohio law.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a negotiated agreement to provide maintenance and support services for the Authority's Computer Aided Dispatch and Automated Vehicle Locator ("CAD/AVL") system for a period of five (5) years.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority utilizes "OnRoute" software, a product of Trapeze Software Group, Inc. dba Vontas ("Vontas"), for its CAD/AVL system. The CAD/AVL system, along with the Authority's radio system, allows the Authority to track vehicles, monitor on-time performance, talk/text with vehicle operators, obtain real-time vehicle tracking and operator turn-by-turn navigation, and provides remote device management and vehicle diagnostics for predictive maintenance. In order for the CAD/AVL and radio system to function properly, the hardware and software must be maintained and operational at all times. If one software or hardware component fails, it can affect the entire system and, in many cases cause other areas of the system to fail. A maintenance and service agreement with the original provider is vital to the operation of the CAD/AVL system. If there is a hardware or software failure, the Authority will need Vontas to correct the problem as quickly as possible. In addition to software fixes (patches), the Authority will also receive free upgrades and training.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Per R.C. 306.43(H)(3), competitive procedures are not required when the expenditure is for a renewal or renegotiation of a lease or license for telecommunications or electronic data processing equipment, services, or systems, or for the upgrade of such equipment, services, or systems, or for the maintenance thereof, as supplied by the original source or its successors or assigns. Vontas is the original provider and developer of the Authority's CAD/AVL software and hardware.

The Procurement Department requested a proposal from Vontas on November 16, 2023. Vontas offered to provide CAD/AVL maintenance and support services for a period of five (5) years in a total contract amount not to exceed \$4,559,274.00 (2024 - \$825,549.00; 2025 - \$866,480.00; 2026 - \$909,697.00; 2027 - \$955,021.00; and 2028 - \$1,002,527.00). The Information Technology and Procurement Departments reviewed the proposal for adherence to the technical requirements. The proposal submitted by Vontas, as negotiated, is 13% below the independent cost estimate of \$5,225,000.00, which was based on historical pricing.

A cost analysis has been performed, and the Procurement Department determined that the negotiated price is fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: A 0% DBE goal was established for this procurement because it is for the maintenance of proprietary software, in which work is limited and exclusive to the original provider and installer by agreement.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This contract shall be payable through the General Fund, Information Technology Department budget, in amounts not to exceed \$825,549.00 Fiscal Year ("FY") 2024, \$866,480.00 FY 2025, \$909,697.00 FY 2026, \$955,021.00 FY 2027, and \$1,002,527.00 FY 2028, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$4,559,274.00 for a period of five (5) years.

Property Insurance Renewal – Updated Renewal Negotiations

As you recall at the December 5, 2023, Audit, Safety, Compliance and Real Estate Committee meeting, Judy Lincoln gave a presentation regarding our Property Insurance Renewal. At that time, Liberty Mutual quoted a 13% rate increase over the expiring premium. However, since then, GCRTA's property insurance broker, AON, has negotiated Liberty down to a 10.2% rate increase (\$24,266 premium reduction).

Thus, our new grand total cost is \$1,469,243, which is a premium increase of \$137,106 vs the expiring premium of \$1,332,137. Lastly, we are now 11% below our budgeted amount of \$1,653,000.

The attached resolution contains our updates and recommendation to renew with Liberty Mutual and Evanston Insurance Company for the period January 1, 2024 to January 1, 2025 as well as further detail on the decision made. We thank our partners, Liberty Mutual and Evanston, for recognizing our commitment to risk improvement.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will provide the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") with insurance to protect the physical assets of the Authority for a period of twelve (12) months.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority requires all-risk property insurance to protect its physical assets in case of fire, explosion, windstorm, and similar perils. The current property insurance policy expires January 1, 2024. The detailed results of efforts to renew the property insurance programs were summarized in the presentation made to the Board of Trustees on December 5, 2023.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Authority carries an all-risk property insurance policy which protects the Authority's physical assets from fire, windstorm, explosion, and similar perils. Incumbent Carriers are Liberty Mutual and Evanston Insurance Company for two separate programs with a Total Insured Value of \$1.9 billion:
 - The first program is written by Liberty Mutual and is for the coverage of all GCRTA real and personal property, including rolling stock when garaged. The blanket limit is \$500 million with a deductible of \$250,000.00.
 - The second program is a stand-alone Rolling Stock policy written by Evanston Insurance Company, which provides coverage for GCRTA rolling stock when rolling (both rail and bus). The blanket limit is \$25 million with a deductible of \$500,000.00.

Last year in 2022 we continued to face hard market conditions and rate increases due to severe industry loss experience, as well as inflationary pressures and undervaluation of reported values in the industry, which required significant increases to insured values. Those two factors combined resulted in a final premium increase of approximately 12% last year. Our expiring premium is \$1,332,137.00.

To provide some perspective on the commercial property insurance market in 2023, national average rates increased 13.9% in the first quarter, increasing to 25.5% in the second quarter. In the third quarter, there was some market improvement and national averages were down to approximately 13% rate increases as of the end of Q3. The continued rate increases are largely a result of continued poor loss experience, due mainly to the Florida wind storms and hurricanes as well as severe convective storms.

Our property insurance brokers approached a number of competitive insurance markets this year, but the most favorable outcome continues to result from the current program structure with the two incumbent carriers described above.

After receiving the results of the marketing and negotiation efforts, Liberty Mutual quoted a 10.2% rate increase. Evanston Insurance Company quoted a 2.3% rate increase.

After applying these rates against updated total insured values (TIV), the resulting premium is \$1,469,243.00, an increase of \$137,106.00 or approximately 10.3%. This encompasses both the rate and insured value increases. The Authority is pleased to report that this amount is \$183,757.00.00 or 11.1% below the budgeted amount of \$1,653,000.00.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/ DBE BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This insurance policy will be funded through the General Fund, Risk Management Department budget, payable with 2024 funds (contingent upon Board approval of the 2024 Operating Budget), for a total contract amount not to exceed \$1,469,243.00 for the twelve (12) month period beginning January 1, 2024.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: <u>Reject this offer</u>. Rejection of this offer will leave the Authority without property insurance, putting substantial assets of the Authority at risk.
- 8.0 RECOMMENDATION: This property insurance program was discussed by the Board of Trustees at the December 5, 2023 Audit, Safety Compliance and Real Estate Committee meeting. It is recommended that the submittal of the underwriters, through Aon Risk Services Northeast, Inc., be accepted and the resolution passed authorizing the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer to purchase the property insurance policies.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will authorize an appropriations budget for Fiscal Year ("FY") 2024 ("FY 2024 Budget") for the operation of the transit system, including required fund transfers for the funds established by Chapter 460 of the Codified Rules and Regulations of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Funds").
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: FY 2024 Budget begins January 1, 2024 and ends December 31, 2024.

The process for developing the FY 2024 Budget began in July 2023 with the adoption of the FY 2024 Tax Budget. It also involved extensive staff analysis and preparation as well as a presentation to the Board's Operational Planning & Infrastructure Committee on November 14, 2023. A second presentation was made on December 5, 2023. One public hearing was held on November 14, 2023, and a second public hearing was held on December 5, 2023 to discuss the FY 2024 Budget. The budget and fund transfers proposed for adoption herein represent GCRTA's spending plans for FY 2024.

- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 4.0 DBE/AFFIRMATIVE ACTION BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: The FY 2024 Budget totals \$333,845,575. It includes salaries, overtime, payroll taxes, and fringe benefit resources to fund 2,423 FTE positions. This cost is based on the Management and Non-Bargaining Salary Structure approved by the Board through Resolution No. 2022-112 on December 20, 2022, as updated by staff in Attachment 1 to this resolution. Adoption of this budget will fulfill GCRTA's legal and managerial requirements to establish the revenues and expenditures for the operation of GCRTA's public transit system. The 2024 Capital Improvement Budget was approved by the Board of Trustees through Resolution No. 2023-040 on May 16, 2023.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: The proposed FY 2024 Budget provides for spending \$333,845,575 on estimated revenues of \$335,447,051. The projected beginning balance for 2024 is \$22,025,630. The projected year-end balance of \$23,627,106 will provide the operating reserve required by Section 460.02(c)(2) of the Codified Rules and Regulations of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: Modify the proposed FY 2024 Budget by adding or subtracting expenditures or revenues for specific activities, positions, or programs.

- 8.0 RECOMMENDATION: The proposed FY 2024 Budget has been reviewed by the Operational Planning & Infrastructure Committee and is recommended for adoption. It is recommended that the Board approve the proposed FY 2024 Budget, fund transfers, and budgets for the Funds as proposed herein.

RESOLUTION NO. 2023-103

MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES FOR THE GREATER CLEVELAND REGIONAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY DURING FISCAL YEAR 2024

WHEREAS, the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("GCRTA") has both a legal and managerial requirement to establish the revenues to be received for the upcoming fiscal year, including all taxes, user fees, and other types of revenues, as well as estimates of all expenditures or outlays for the operation of its public transportation system in the fiscal year ("FY") to be paid or met from said revenue; and

WHEREAS, in order to meet those requirements, a budget for GCRTA's operations for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2024 and ending December 31, 2024 ("FY 2024 Budget") was prepared; and

WHEREAS, the FY 2024 Budget has been made available for public inspection for at least ten (10) days by having at least two (2) copies thereof on file in the GCRTA Office of Management and Budget and a copy posted on GCRTA's web site; and

WHEREAS, the FY 2024 Budget is based on the Management and Non-Bargaining Salary Structure approved on December 20, 2022 by the Board of Trustees in Resolution No. 2022-112, which remains unchanged as set forth in Attachment 1; and

WHEREAS, the Operational Planning & Infrastructure Committee of the Board of Trustees discussed the FY 2024 Budget on November 14, 2023 and December 5, 2023, and public hearings were held on November 14, 2023 and December 5, 2023, with public notices given by publication in the Cleveland Plain Dealer and the Call & Post on October 26, 2023 and October 29, 2023, as well as by posting of notice in the first floor lobby of the GCRTA Main Office Building and on GCRTA's Facebook and Twitter pages.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, Cuyahoga County, Ohio:

Section 2. That transfers of funds may be made in the FY 2024 Budget from one division to another, or from one department to another, or from one line item to another, or from one of the funds established by Chapter 460 of the Codified Rules and Regulations of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Fund") to another, as long as the total appropriation in the Fund is not exceeded and transfers of funds is reported to the Board within thirty (30) days after the end of the month in which said transfer occurred.

Section 3. As part of this appropriation, the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is granted the authority to upgrade or downgrade positions within GCRTA, provided that the total number of positions approved in the budget is not exceeded. Furthermore, the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer may transfer positions from one department to another so long as the total number of positions approved in the budget does not exceed 2,423 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions.

Section 4. That the budget includes an appropriation of funds for coffee, meals, refreshments, and other amenities for employees or other persons in furtherance of official business of GCRTA, and such expenditures are hereby determined to be for a public purpose.

Section 5. That the FY 2024 Budget may, from time to time, be amended and additional monies received in FY 2024, if applicable, may be appropriated.

Section 6. That this resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

212.01 DEFINITIONS.

As used in these <u>Policies and Procedures</u>Codified <u>Rules and Regulations of the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority</u>, unless otherwise expressly provided or the context otherwise requires:

- (a) "And" may be read "or," and "or" may be read "and," if the sense requires it.
- (b) "Authority" means the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, established pursuant to Ohio-R.C. 306.32.
- (c) "Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, appointed as provided in Ohio-R.C. 306.33.
- (d) "County" means Cuyahoga County, Ohio.
- (e) "Land" and "real estate" include rights and easements of an incorporeal nature."
- (f) Law" means any and all laws, including constitutions, statutes, ordinances, resolutions, rules, regulations, motions and orders, of the United States, any state, any political subdivision of a state, any municipal corporation or any other legal entity.
- (g) "May" is permissive.
- (h) "Month" means a calendar month.
- (i) "Motion" means a legislative enactment of the Board of Trustees that is recorded in the minutes of the Board but which is not separately published.

- (j) "Owner," when applied to property, includes a part owner, joint owner or tenant in common of the whole or any part of such property.
- (k) "Person" means the State, a municipal corporation, a political subdivision, a public or private corporation, an individual, a partnership, a firm, an association, a business trust, an estate, a trust or any other entity.
- (l) "Premises," when used as applicable to property, extends to and includes land and buildings.
- (m) "Property" includes real and personal property and any mixed and lesser estates or interests therein. "Personal property" includes every kind of property except real property; "real property" includes land, tenements and hereditaments.
- (n) "Public place" means any place to or upon which the public resorts or travels, whether such place is owned or controlled by a municipality, the State or the United States, or any agency of the State or the United States, or is a place to or upon which the public resorts or travels by custom or by invitation, express or implied.
- (o) "Reasonable time" means such time only as may be necessary for the prompt performance of an act or the giving of required notice.
- (p) "Residence" means an abode in which a person permanently resides.
- (q) "Resolution" means a legislative enactment of the Board of Trustees that is separately published and recorded.
- (r) "Shall" is mandatory.
- (s) "Sidewalk" means that portion of a street between the curb lines or lateral lines and the right-of-way lines, which is intended for the use of pedestrians.
- (t) "State" means the State of Ohio.
- (u) "Street," "highway" and "alley" mean the entire width subject to an easement for public right of way, or owned in fee by a municipality, county or the State, of every way or place, of whatever nature, whenever any part thereof is open to the use of the public as a matter of right for purposes of public travel. The word "alley" means any such way or place providing a secondary means of ingress and egress from a property.
- (v) "Transit facility" means:
- (1) A street railway, motor bus, tramline, subway, monorail, rapid transit, aeroplane airplane, helicopter, ferry or other ground or water transportation system having as its primary purpose the regularly scheduled mass movement of passengers between locations within the territorial boundaries of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, including all rights of way, power lines, rolling stock, equipment, machinery, terminals, buildings, administration and maintenance and repair facilities, and supporting parking facilities, and franchise rights attendant thereto, but excluding therefrom trucks and facilities designed for use in the movement of property by truck;
- (2) Docks, wharves, warehouses, piers and other port, terminal or transportation facilities and marinas;
 - (3) Facilities used, available for use or designed for use to aid in the

safe taking off or landing of aircraft, for the safety, storage and maintenance of aircraft, for the comfort and accommodation of users of air transportation, including persons, property and mail, or for the safe and efficient operation and maintenance of an airport, and buildings and facilities as are reasonably necessary for the comfort and accommodation of the users of transit facilities; or

- (4) Any combination of the foregoing.
- (w) "Written" and "in writing" include any representation of words, letters or figures, whether by printing or otherwise.

212.02 RULES OF CONSTRUCTION.

- (a) Common and Technical Use. Words and phrases shall be read in context and construed according to the rules of grammar and common usage. Words and phrases that have acquired a technical or particular meaning, whether by legislative definition or otherwise, shall be construed accordingly.
 - (b) Singular and Plural; Gender; Tense.
 - (1) The singular includes the plural, and the plural includes the singular.
 - (2) Words of one gender include the other genders.
 - (3) Words in the present tense include the future.
 - (c) Computation of Time.
- (1) The time within which an act is required by law to be done shall be computed by excluding the first and including the last day; except that when the last day falls on Sunday or a legal holiday, then the act may be done on the next succeeding day which is not Sunday or a legal holiday.
- (2) If a number of months is to be computed by counting the months from a particular day, the period ends on the same numerical day in the concluding month as the day of the month from which the computation is begun, unless there are not that many days in the concluding month, in which case the period ends on the last day of that month.
- (3) When an act is to take effect or become operative from and after a day named, no part of that day shall be included.
- (d) Liberal Construction. All general provisions, terms, phrases and expressions contained in these <u>Codified Rules and Regulations</u> <u>Policies and Procedures of the Board of Trustees</u> of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority shall be liberally construed in order that the true intent and meaning of the Board of Trustees may be fully carried out.
- (e) Minimum Requirements. In the interpretation and application of these <u>Codified Rules and Regulations</u> Policies and Procedures, they shall be held to be the minimum requirements adopted for the promotion of the public health, safety, comfort, convenience and general welfare.

212.03 REVIVOR; EFFECT OF RE-ENACTMENT, AMENDMENT OR REPEAL.

- (a) The repeal of a repealing provision of these <u>Codified Rules and RegulationsPolicies and Procedures of the Board of Trustees</u> of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority does not revive the provision originally repealed or impair the effect of any saving clause therein.
- (b) The re-enactment, amendment or repeal of a provision of these <u>Codified</u> <u>Rules and Regulations</u> <u>Policies and Procedures</u> does not, except as provided in subsection (c) hereof:
- (1) Affect the prior operation of the provision or any prior action taken thereunder;

- (c) In the event of a conflict or inconsistency between any of the provisions of these <u>Codified Rules and Regulations Policies and Procedures</u>, including provisions of codes, rules, regulations, agreements, policies, procedures or other documents adopted by reference in these <u>Codified Rules and Regulations Policies and Procedures</u>, or otherwise adopted by the Board of Trustees but not codified in full in these <u>Codified Rules and Regulations Policies and Procedures</u>, and a provision of <u>State state</u> or <u>Federal federal</u> law, the provision of <u>State state</u> or <u>Federal federal</u> law shall control, except in those cases where the Board of Trustees is expressly authorized by <u>State state</u> or <u>Federal federal</u> law to enact legislation that is not consistent with <u>State state</u> and/or <u>Federal federal</u> law.

212.06 SEVERABILITY.

212.01 DEFINITIONS.

- (a) "And" may be read "or," and "or" may be read "and," if the sense requires it.
- (b) "Authority" means the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, established pursuant to R.C. 306.32.
- (c) "Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, appointed as provided in R.C. 306.33.
- (d) "County" means Cuyahoga County, Ohio.
- (e) "Land" and "real estate" include rights and easements of an incorporeal nature."
- (f) Law" means any and all laws, including constitutions, statutes, ordinances, resolutions, rules, regulations, motions and orders, of the United States, any state, any political subdivision of a state, any municipal corporation or any other legal entity.
- (g) "May" is permissive.
- (h) "Month" means a calendar month.
- (i) "Motion" means a legislative enactment of the Board of Trustees that is recorded in the minutes of the Board but which is not separately published.
- (j) "Owner," when applied to property, includes a part owner, joint owner or

- tenant in common of the whole or any part of such property.
- (k) "Person" means the State, a municipal corporation, a political subdivision, a public or private corporation, an individual, a partnership, a firm, an association, a business trust, an estate, a trust or any other entity.
- (l) "Premises," when used as applicable to property, extends to and includes land and buildings.
- (m) "Property" includes real and personal property and any mixed and lesser estates or interests therein. "Personal property" includes every kind of property except real property; "real property" includes land, tenements and hereditaments.
- (n) "Public place" means any place to or upon which the public resorts or travels, whether such place is owned or controlled by a municipality, the State or the United States, or any agency of the State or the United States, or is a place to or upon which the public resorts or travels by custom or by invitation, express or implied.
- (o) "Reasonable time" means such time only as may be necessary for the prompt performance of an act or the giving of required notice.
- (p) "Residence" means an abode in which a person permanently resides.
- (q) "Resolution" means a legislative enactment of the Board of Trustees that is separately published and recorded.
- (r) "Shall" is mandatory.
- (s) "Sidewalk" means that portion of a street between the curb lines or lateral lines and the right-of-way lines, which is intended for the use of pedestrians.
- (t) "State" means the State of Ohio.
- (u) "Street," "highway" and "alley" mean the entire width subject to an easement for public right of way, or owned in fee by a municipality, county or the State, of every way or place, of whatever nature, whenever any part thereof is open to the use of the public as a matter of right for purposes of public travel. The word "alley" means any such way or place providing a secondary means of ingress and egress from a property.
- (v) "Transit facility" means:
- (1) A street railway, motor bus, tramline, subway, monorail, rapid transit, airplane, helicopter, ferry or other ground or water transportation system having as its primary purpose the regularly scheduled mass movement of passengers between locations within the territorial boundaries of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, including all rights of way, power lines, rolling stock, equipment, machinery, terminals, buildings, administration and maintenance and repair facilities, and supporting parking facilities, and franchise rights attendant thereto, but excluding therefrom trucks and facilities designed for use in the movement of property by truck;
- (2) Docks, wharves, warehouses, piers and other port, terminal or transportation facilities and marinas;
- (3) Facilities used, available for use or designed for use to aid in the safe taking off or landing of aircraft, for the safety, storage and maintenance of aircraft, for the comfort and accommodation of users of air transportation, including persons, property and mail, or for the safe and efficient operation and maintenance of

an airport, and buildings and facilities as are reasonably necessary for the comfort and accommodation of the users of transit facilities; or

- (4) Any combination of the foregoing.
- (w) "Written" and "in writing" include any representation of words, letters or figures, whether by printing or otherwise.

212.02 RULES OF CONSTRUCTION.

- (a) Common and Technical Use. Words and phrases shall be read in context and construed according to the rules of grammar and common usage. Words and phrases that have acquired a technical or particular meaning, whether by legislative definition or otherwise, shall be construed accordingly.
 - (b) Singular and Plural; Gender; Tense.
 - (1) The singular includes the plural, and the plural includes the singular.
 - (2) Words of one gender include the other genders.
 - (3) Words in the present tense include the future.
 - (c) Computation of Time.
- (1) The time within which an act is required by law to be done shall be computed by excluding the first and including the last day; except that when the last day falls on Sunday or a legal holiday, then the act may be done on the next succeeding day which is not Sunday or a legal holiday.
- (2) If a number of months is to be computed by counting the months from a particular day, the period ends on the same numerical day in the concluding month as the day of the month from which the computation is begun, unless there are not that many days in the concluding month, in which case the period ends on the last day of that month.
- (3) When an act is to take effect or become operative from and after a day named, no part of that day shall be included.
- (d) Liberal Construction. All general provisions, terms, phrases and expressions contained in these Codified Rules and Regulations of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority shall be liberally construed in order that the true intent and meaning of the Board of Trustees may be fully carried out.
- (e) Minimum Requirements. In the interpretation and application of these Codified Rules and Regulations, they shall be held to be the minimum requirements adopted for the promotion of the public health, safety, comfort, convenience and general welfare.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will approve a Collective Bargaining Agreement ("CBA") with the Fraternal Order of Police/Ohio Labor Council, Inc. ("FOP/OLC"). The term of the agreement will be from the signing of the contract through August 31, 2026. The proposed CBA describes the "Conditions of Employment" for lieutenants of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("GCRTA") Transit Police Department covered by the FOP/OLC Gold bargaining unit. This CBA covers about 4 to 5 employees of GCRTA's approximate 2,200 active positions.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The FOP/OLC Gold bargaining unit is a newly recognized bargaining unit. Negotiations for an agreement for this bargaining unit commenced on September 7, 2023. Four joint bargaining sessions occurred during September through November of 2023 between representatives of the FOP/OLC and the GCRTA. These negotiations culminated in a tentative agreement for a CBA being reached between the parties on November 27, 2023. The CBA was approved by union membership on December 4, 2023.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 4.0 DBE/AFFIRMATIVE ACTION BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: The subject action has important policy implications, principally in the areas of cost control and labor relations.
